

## USUAL SCHEMES TO GET THE MONEY MARK CAMPAIGN

Candidates Offered "Rare" Privilege of Addressing Meetings and Reaping Benefit of Combination Publicity.

With the approach of the city campaign the usual schemes to separate candidates from their money are coming in evidence, a new one being promoted under the name of "The Woodrow Wilson National League and the Melting Pot." The inducements offered include the rare privilege of addressing meetings held under its auspices and the benefits of combination publicity.

The first promised meeting was held Monday night at Sixteenth and Locust streets, where less than 10 voters responded to an invitation on a large banner. The second meeting was to be held Tuesday night at Twentieth and Q streets, but was called off when only a few boys and two voters showed up. A band of 10 players failed to arouse the expected interest. The leaders of the band said the music had been engaged by the discredited W. F. Stoecker.

**Meeting Called Off.**  
The man who collected the money from the candidates is known as Brooks, or Brookstein, and represents himself as head of the "Woodrow Wilson National League." A meeting advertised for Benson was called off. Albert Kaplan has been making the circuit as chairman of the meetings and one of the amusing features is that Kaplan declared he would not let Stoecker address these meetings, but took a different view of the situation when told that Stoecker had a proprietary interest.

One of the methods used by the promoters of these meetings was to announce on a large banner that Mayor Dahlman and other candidates would speak, but the mayor has stopped this unauthorized use of his name.

Among the candidates who have attended the meetings and presumably have "come across" were: M. J. Sullivan, Jr., Al Schultz, Hugo Melchior, Henry Rohlf, L. J. Quinby, Alfred McGlone, Jabez Cross and Frank C. Gardiner. Other candidates are listed as members of the "League."

### Speakers Arouse Audience By Liberty Bond Appeal

An audience of 2,000 people gathered in the Auditorium building last night and heard Gaylord Saltzgeber, commissioner of pensions and representative of the Treasury department; Mrs. Cora G. Lewis, representing the women's national council, and Chaplain Clarence N. Bigelow of Camp Dodge explain the third Liberty loan.

They are making a tour of the state and causing Iowa to blush with shame on account of the failure of many localities to meet their quotas of the last bond issue. They are working under the direction of the federal government.

They arrived in the city yesterday morning and spent the day in preparatory work for the big drive beginning next month. They held conferences with the city and county Liberty loan committees and gave valuable information concerning the plan of campaign.

Commissioner Saltzgeber told of the enormous amount of work accomplished by the government in war preparations and the note that rang through all of the speeches was that criticism of the department aided the enemies of the country and compromised the work that must be done to win the war.

Chaplain Bigelow almost swept the audience from its feet by his eloquent appeal for unity of thought and action.

### Ice Falls Into Line With Wartime H. C. L.

If you use ice during the coming summer you will pay more for it than ever before. Effective April 1 the price will be advanced and consumers will have to pay 50 cents a 100 pounds, or 10 per cent more than last year. Blame it onto the war.

Last year when the consumer of ice bought a book of coupons, by paying cash, there was a reduction of 10 per cent from the 50 cents per 100-pound price. This year the discount is to be eliminated and the price will be 50 cents a 100 pounds.

Dealers in both manufactured and natural ice assert that the advance in price is a matter of necessity, if they are to continue in business. They say that they have increased the wages of their men and that feed for the horses used in delivering has advanced 50 to 100 per cent. They point to the fact that last summer they were buying hay at \$6 to \$8 a ton and that the same quality of hay now costs them \$20 to \$22. They say that last year they bought oats at 40 to 60 cents a bushel and that now the same quality of oats cost 90 cents to \$1 a bushel. All other expenses they say have increased proportionately.
