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TOPICS FOR SABBATH

Back From Trenches, Dr. Lowe at First Methodist Will Tell of War in Europe.

Right from the trenches and battlefields of Europe, at the evening services at the First Methodist church, Dr. Titus Lowe, the pastor, will recount some of his experiences in the war zone.

After having spent six months on the war front, Friday morning Dr. Lowe returned to Omaha to resume his pastoral work in the First Methodist church. At the morning services Sunday he will speak on "Watchman, What of the Night?" and in the evening, on "With the American Forces in France." Both sermons have to do with war.

At the evening services of the First Baptist church, the pastor, Rev. Alonzo Alvin DeLame, in his sermon, will delve into politics to the extent of discussing "The Church's Relation to the City and the Christian's Duty at the Polls Next Tuesday." There will be a post-Easter musical.

In his evening sermon, Rev. William H. Spence, pastor of the Hanscom Park Methodist church will discuss the war and at the same time give the third Liberty loan a boost. His topic is "America, the Kaiser and the Third Liberty Loan."

At the morning services of the First Presbyterian church, the pastor, Rev. E. Hart Jenks, will deliver a memorial address for John Monroe Banister, one of the young men of the church, who enlisted and was killed in France while fighting with the allies. The young man was a son of Colonel and Mrs. Banister.

Instead of the regular evening services of the Wheeler Memorial Presbyterian church, there will be an Easter program. It is a cantata, "Some of the Missions of the Easter Lily." The parts will be taken by the children of the Sunday school. The morning services will be held as usual. The Lord's supper will be observed.

Rev. W. H. Pilot, city specialist for the American Baptist Home Mission society, will speak at Trinity Baptist church on the South Side, Sunday morning. He is making a religious and social survey of the city of Omaha.

A new departure in church meetings and one which will carry veteran men and women back to civil war days when churches held patriotic rallies and at the close had the young men of the congregation sign the muster rolls, will be inaugurated Sunday night when the Congregational churches of Greater Omaha will unite in a great patriotic rally in the auditorium of the First Congregational church. This gathering will not be a church service in the ordinary sense, but a gathering of the patriotic citizens of America to register their confidence in the government and their loyalty to the cause that the government has given its soldiers to defend.

Rev. Fred J. Clark has arranged a program for the occasion. Ed P. Smith has been secured as speaker of the evening. Mrs. Fred J. Clark, by special invitation, will sing "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." In addition to the regular music, Miss Loretta Delone, recently from New York, but now well known in Omaha, will play at least three numbers on the harp: "Liberty March," which has been rechristened "Sammy's March to the West Front," "The American Fantasy" and the "Sextette from Lucia."

The meeting will begin promptly at 7:45. Before the patriotic rally begins the men's club of the church will act as hosts at a social Sunday evening in the parlors of the church, to which a cordial invitation is extended. The women are invited to this social feature as well as the men.
