Moscow, Thursday, April 25 .- (Via Vladivostok, April 26.)—The news-paper Azvestia publishes various letters which were found upon M. Kolodona, a Vladivostok member of the Siberian autonomous government, bearing on projected negotiations with the representatives of the allied powers at Vladivostok and Peking for the recognition of Siberia. The letters urged haste, saying that delay would atrengthen Japanese influence to the disadvantage of all others. "In commenting on this the bolshevik Pravda, says:

"The mask is torn off the 'allied' mats, who are waiting at Vologda for the moment to overthrow the power of the workmen's and soldiers' deputies. The documents which we publish today establish indisputably the program of action which has been feverishly mapped out by the allied pupils, according to the method pupils, according to the method taught by the German teachers of im-perialistic banditism."
