Lieut. Russell Philp, Field Artillery, Writes From Front

Rev. C. C. Wilson, pastor of Grace Methodist Episcopal church, South Side, is in receipt of a letter from Lieutenant Russell Philp, with the 17th field artillery, somewhere in France. The lieutenant said:

"We landed in France last December and, after three days, arrived at a splendid group of French barracks. They were large stone buildings situated on the top of a hill. The surrounding country was rather hilly and covered with timber. We had very little snow and cold weather in France this past winter.

"The target range was about 15 kilometers long by 10 wide, so we had plenty of room to fire even the big guns with which my regiment is equipped.

"We have the 155 mm. howitzer, a beautiful gun for knocking down towns, or blowing up trenches and barbed-wire entanglements.

"We had 10 weeks training in this camp and moved to the part of the front we now are on. We have been in this particular sector for a little more than two weeks. It is quite a job to move a regiment of artillery into a sector and get settled. The men must get their dugouts fixed up, also their kitchens and ammunition dumps.

"The lines of communication must be organized. In our present location my own battalion has 30 kilometers of telephone line, and the positions of the batteries and all their observatories must be accurately located on the map.

"After we are once settled down we haven't anything to do except bother the boche by killing them or knocking down the house from over their heads, but so far it has always been the boche who crashed down on the hard rocks.

"It is rather exciting to hear the shells come whistling along, getting louder and louder, and to wonder where they are going to land."

TWO CARS HOGS, BRINGING \$3,559, GO TO RED CROSS

Central City and Scribner Farmers Join in Live Stock Movement to Aid in War Fund Campaign.

Two carloads of hogs from Scribner and Central City were sold at the South Side market Saturday, the proceeds going to the local chapters of the Red Cross.

The Scribner load of 57 head weighed 12,520 pounds and was sold by the Great Western Commission company to Armour & Co. for \$16.90 per 100 pounds, netting \$2,085.25. The Central City load of 42 head weighed 8,620 pounds and was sold by the Interstate Commission company to Armour & Co. for \$17.10 per 100 pounds, netting \$1,474.02.

The commission companies handled the shipments free of charge.

Since February 21 the proceeds from the sale of Red Cross hogs have amounted to \$186,300.

CLOTURE RULE TO LIMIT SENATE DEBATE PROPOSED

Washington, May 4.—Less debate in the senate during the war is proposed in a resolution introduced today by Senator Underwood of Alabama, reported to have considerable support. As a substitute for the present cloture rule permitting two-thirds of the senate to limit a senator's argument to one hour pending legislation, Senator Underwood's resolution would give a majority power to invoke cloture by limiting debate after a subject has been discussed two days to twenty minutes on the bill itself and ten minutes on amendments. The rule will be operative only during the war.

South Side Youngsters Stage Benefit "Show" for Red Cross

Six South Side girls and two boys, ranging in age from 9 to 15 years, staged a "show" of their own composition at the home of M. A. Gillen, 5129 South Twenty-ninth street, last Sunday, and turned the proceeds of \$5.15 over to the Red Cross.

The "show" consisted of dialogues, vaudeville sketches, music and a tableau. William Gillen, 11 years old, a pupil of St. John's school, was the "Four Minute" speaker, and gave a talk of his own composition.

House Votes President Broad Passport Powers

Washington, May 4.—The house today passed the administration passport bill requiring all persons entering the United States to have a government permit and giving the president broad powers in restraining entrance to and exit from American ports.

During debate Representative Flood of Virginia, chairman of the foreign affairs committee, declared hundreds of American citizens now in Germany are disloyal to the United States and that this country knows they are disloyal. One of the purposes of the measure he said was to prevent their return and probable spying on the war activities of the country.

The bill now goes to the senate.

Texas Gets Heavy Rain After Four Years' Routh

San Angelo, Tex., May 4.—After 12 hours of intermittent showers, a slow steady rain began falling again at day break today throughout the greater portion of the region that has been stricken by a two year drought. Since Thursday midnight the average at noon today was two inches. This is the first heavy general rain in four years.

Only Sixteen Delegates Respond to Call for Convention; Will Celebrate Anniversary of Birth of Carl Marx.

Sixteen accredited delegates responded to the call of the biennial state convention of Nebraska socialists yesterday at a hall at Twenty-first and Cumming streets.

U. S. Labor Delegation Given Official Welcome in Paris

Paris, May 4.—The American labor delegation which has been visiting England arrived at the Metropolitan station in Paris late last evening and was welcomed by Minister of Labor Collyard on behalf of the French government.

Chairman James Wilson and George L. Barry of the mission declared they were delighted with their stay in England.

"Even the pessimists do not talk peace, but are willing to carry on the war to the bitter end," they said.

MAY CUT OFF COAL SUPPLY OF PLANTS THAT WASTE FUEL

Washington, May 4.—Drastic checks on industrial fuel consumption are under consideration by the fuel administration. P. E. Noyes, director of conservation, plans to have inspectors in industrial plants to supervise the use of coal.

Fuel administration officials say enormous amounts of coal are wasted through inefficient firing and obsolete equipment.

Mr. Noyes appeared today before the house appropriations committee and asked \$1,500,000 for the inspection service. His plans contemplate the rating of plants on their boiler efficiency for the delivery of coal.

Plants wasting coal will be required to take corrective measures, or their coal supply may be cut off. The program, it is said, will save from 25,000,000 to 30,000,000 tons of coal a year.
