REDMAN, OMAHAN, DECORATED WITH CROIX DE GUERRE

Knew Nothing About Bravery Being Noted Until He Applied for a Furlough; Parents Live at Salt Lake.

Frederick G. Redman, who was reared in Omaha and whose parents now live at Salt Lake City, was recently decorated on the firing line in France with the Croix de Guerre.

He is now at the front with an American ambulance company. He knew nothing about his bravery being noted and followed in battle until he applied for a furlough in Paris.

The comment which accompanied the decoration is in French and is as follows: "The principal doctor of the second division, Ferrand medical division, cites to the order of the sanitary formations the soldier whose name follows: Redman, Frederick G., American driver No. 10,295, Utah. A courageous driver, modest and always ready to accomplish the most perilous missions."

I. W. W. LETTERS TO BARE PLOTS OPPOSING WAR

Chicago, May 4.—Testimony tending to show that William D. ("Big Bill") Hayden and other "cabinet members" of the Industrial Workers of the World directed the anti-war activities of the organization from the Chicago headquarters was introduced today in the trial of 112 leaders charged with violating the espionage act.

Scores of letters and documents bearing signatures of Hayden, the general secretary-treasurer, and his assistance were identified by the government and identified by witnesses, some of whom are now employed by the organization.

Admission of these letters over protest of defense counsel and establishment of the signatures were held, according to government attorneys, form the links in a chain of evidence that the nation-wide conspiracy to disrupt America's war program was entered into by leaders at secret meetings here.

Renewed efforts to have the correspondence, especially that seized from the private files of Hayden, returned to the organization met with failure.

American Marine Tonnage Being Increased Rapidly

Washington, May 4.—Exact figures on the progress of the merchant ship building program this year, disclosed today for the first time, show that under direction of the shipping board there have been launched 236 steel and wooden vessels with an aggregate tonnage of 1,440,627.

There are now operating 157 shipyards with 753 ways in use. There are 398 steels ways, 332 wooden ways, either completed or under construction; four concrete ways, and 19 ways devoted to naval work.

The grand total of contract and requisitioned ships already launched is 1,332,127 tons. Already delivered are 138 vessels with a total tonnage of 977,371. Wooden ships launched number 35 with an approximate tonnage of 108,500.

Daniel A. Poling to Deliver Message Here From Trenches

Daniel A. Poling, associate president of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, has just returned from France, where he has been in the front line trenches with the American boys. He will speak in Omaha Sunday night, May 12, at the city Auditorium. Mr. Poling has a message for all who are interested in "our boys," a message for the Red Cross, Young Men's Christian association and Young Women's Christian association, and one especially to the young people of America from General Pershing and Lloyd George.

Comptroller's Post Created in Ancient Bank of England

London, May 4.—The directors of the Bank of England announce the creation of a new post to be known as "comptroller of the bank" and the appointment to the new position of Sir Gordon Nairne, at present chief cashier.

Financial writers in the morning newspapers regard this as one of the most important developments in the bank in many years tending to modernize the institution.

Continue Trial of Former Head of Chemical Company

On account of the lack of sufficient evidence against Fred M. Johnson, former general manager of the Universal Chemical company, 314 South Twelfth street, who appeared in police court Saturday morning for a preliminary hearing on a charge of embezzlement of \$25, the case was set over until May 6. M. H. Duemmer, president of the firm, failed to present proper evidence against Johnson.

U. S. Internal Revenue Agent McCabe Goes to California

John A. McCabe, United States internal revenue agent in charge of the Omaha division, has been transferred to Los Angeles, Cal., where he will be in charge of similar work.

John J. Gilligan of Omaha will take the place made vacant by Mr. McCabe's transfer and be in charge of the Omaha internal revenue division, which comprises Nebraska and Iowa.

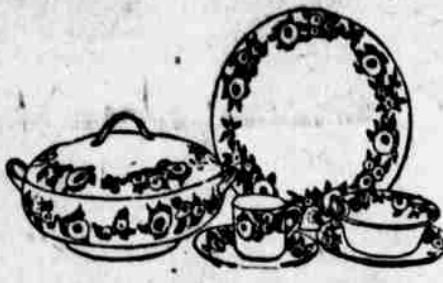
