ZBYSZKO SEIZED FOR INQUIRY AS TO GERMAN PLOTS

New York, May 28.—(Special Telegram.)—Vladek Zbysko, the Polish wrestler, is detained at Ellis Island pending an investigation of his possible knowledge of pro-German ac-tivities here before the United States entered the war.

Several times during the last year Zbyszko has tried to enlist in various branches of the service, but has been rejected for defective hearing. Intimate friends of the wrestler said today that he had always expressed himself as loyal to America and had a deep hatred for Germany, as his brother, Stansislaus, is a prisoner in

Germany. Officials at Ellis Island admitted tonight that Zbyszko had been in their custody for several days. It was learned from other sources that the wrestler was arrested in Boston last Thursday night after he appeared in a bout. He was brought to Ellis Island by military intelligence officers. It is understood he was arrested on orders from Washington after inquiry into his alleged acquaintance with accredited representatives of foreign countries.
