

# EIGHTY GRADUATES OF CREIGHTON UNIVERSITY ARE GIVEN DIPLOMAS

### First Degree of Doctor of Laws Ever Bestowed by Omaha Institution is Awarded to Constantine J. Smyth, Chief Justice of Court of Appeals, District of Columbia.

"It is to the scholar, to the man of broad education, that we must look both now and after the war for the solution of the many problems with which America is menaced," declared Constantine J. Smyth, chief justice of the court of appeals of the District of Columbia, member of the class of '79 of Creighton and speaker at the 28th annual commencement of Creighton university Saturday morning.

Justice Smyth, a former resident of Omaha and at one time a law partner of Mayor Smith, was the recipient before his address of the first degree of doctor of laws, LL. D., ever bestowed by Creighton university. This was announced by Rev. Francis X. McMenamy, S. J., president of the university, as he bestowed the degree.

Tells of Trying Year. President McMenamy in his introductory address at the beginning of the exercises, spoke of the trying year through which the university had passed. With a decree of 60 per cent in attendance in the law school and a graduating class in the college of liberal arts reduced to four members, with 16 professors and almost 800 students and alumni in the service, the university had many difficulties to encounter. All students in the medical and dental schools had enlisted in the medical reserve corps, the university from its endowment had purchased \$60,000 worth of Liberty bonds, but said President McMenamy, "If the war draws away our last student, we will face the issue with calmness."

Archbishop Speaks. Archbishop J. J. Harty of the diocese of Omaha, in a brief word of congratulation to the graduating classes, advised them to hold before them high ideals, to be aggressive and to love America.

The academic procession, headed by Frank O. McCaffrey of the class of 1904 as marshal, left the front of the university and, accompanied by the glee band, marched through the campus into the gymnasium, where the exercises were held.

The graduates were presented to the president for the conferring of degrees by the deans of the several departments. Acting Dean Herman Von W. Schulte, A. B., M. D., presented the graduates of the college of medicine.

Administers Oath. Chief Justice Andrew M. Morrissey of the supreme court of Nebraska administered the oath of allegiance to the federal and state constitutions to the graduates of the law school.

"A Sound Education" was the title of the address of Justice Smyth. "Imperfect notions exist regarding education," said Justice Smyth, "especially because it is supposed that education can be obtained only within institutions of learning, whereas education continues from birth to death. Education in this broader sense is the most important influence in the career of an individual and of a nation. False education has led the sons of Germany to believe that they were destined to inherit the earth. False education has led to the present chaos in Russia."

Great Problems Await. "Great problems await solution in this country. One is that of the proper relation of capital and labor. Another is the inculcation of a proper respect for authority in America. A third important problem is the repression of the spirit of hatred which stalks through the land in the person of men who are seeking to subvert our institutions. Our great need at once is for strong men to solve these problems, not for timid politicians who always have an eye on possible votes after the war. It is the duty of our American universities to furnish these strong men."

Eighty graduates of the class of 1918 of the five departments of Creighton university received their diplomas Saturday morning. The graduating class included four women, Misses Mona H. Cowell and Gladys J. Shamp in the law school,

and Misses Viola Armstrong and Maude V. Giese in the pharmacy school.

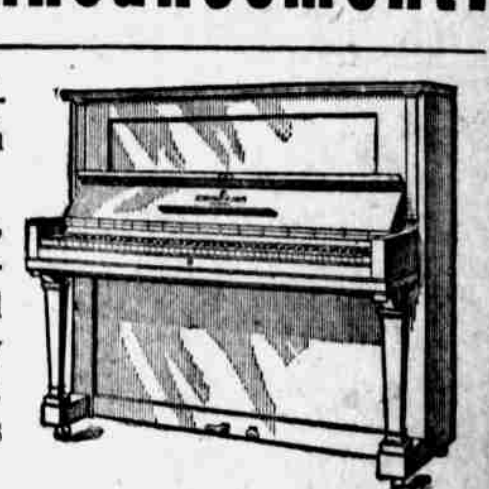
