

GRAIN AND PRODUCE

Corn Advances One to

Five Cents on All Grades.

Omaha, June 7, 1919.

The cash grain market was a comparatively small affair today, only 77 cars arriving in, of which 12 cars were wheat, 46 of corn and 16 of oats. No rye or barley showed up.

Cash corn scored a substantial advance, selling up from 10 to 50 per bushel for the

Three grades, while the 4 and 6 grades sold at even a greater advance. No. 3 white sold today so over the actual sales of this grade yesterday. Trade was slow in getting under way, scarcely any of this cereal being sold before 12:30, principally because of the prices demanded by sellers. No. 3 white and No. 2 yellow sold at \$1.75 and \$1.52, respectively, the white bringing a wide premium over the yellow. No. 3 mixed sold at \$1.50.

Oats sold up 1/4c and 1 1/4c, the early sales 1/4c and 1/2c more than yesterday's sales, while the close sold later on brought an advance of 1/4c to 1 1/4c. The demand for

Scarcity of Supplies Causes Sharp Advance in Corn Market; Close Unsettled.
Chicago, June 7.—Shorts in corn became hurried today as a result of disclosures that the market had become virtually bare of offerings. A sharp advance in prices followed, and the close was unsettled, 1 1/2@2c net higher, with July \$1.37 1/2 to \$1.37 3/4, and August \$1.38. Oats finished unchanged to 1/2c lower and provisions with gains of 12@40c.
