Omaha women interested in the school have subscribed a fund to maintain a school for the resident girls until the close of the war.

It has been a matter of regret to many people of Omaha that the trustees of Brownell Hall should have closed the school because of the lack of suitable buildings, and a self-appointed committee with the co-operation of the present board of trustees undertook to see if something could not be done to tide over this period while the war lasts.

This committee first raised a guaranty fund of \$15,000 to be used in case of a deficit in the running expenses of the school.

It is however, on a quiet street and within easy distance of the main street car lines.

Negotiations have been entered into with a number of leading educators throughout the country and the outlook for principal and teachers is most encouraging.
