



Fue Administrator Calls Attention to Fact That Anthracite Is Not Coming West.

Des Moines- Ia., June 9 .- (Special.) -This is National coal week, during which time it is urged that every consumer of coal in Iowa, immediately order the season's fuel supply.

Upon Iowa mines will fall the burden of taking care of Iowa fuel needs and unless some heroic action is taken, Iowa will, according to fuel representatives throughout the state, experience the most severe fuel famine ever known in its history. The experience of some communities in the state last winter will be no comparison to the sufferings of every community which fails to place in the consumer's bins a big storage supply

of fuel during the summer. D. F. Cushing, fuel representative for the United States fuel administration for Iowa has returned from Philadelphia where he attended the National Coal conference. He brings the assurance that anthracite coal will not come into Iowa this year and that the fuel demands of the government will be in excess of the available supply. The only solution to the fuel situation is, according to his statement, early storage of Iowa soft coal, and stored in such quantities to insure each community of much of its necessary tonnage before the fuel drive next fall begins,

Official Insignia Mourning.

A simple crepe armband ornamented with a golden star to honor a dead war hero may be the official mourning insign of Iowa women for sons, husbands or brothers who lose their lives in the world war. This token of breavement was recommended at the meeting of townsship representatives of the Iowa Women's State Council of Defense. The suggestion has been endorsed by the national organization.

Military Training in College.

Military training may be added to the curriculum of every college in lowa where there is a sufficient number of students to enroll 100 for this course. A. M.
