OMAHA INSURANCE MEN ARE HEARD ON WAR TAXATION Washington, June 12.-Members of

he house ways and means committee gave expression today to a growing mpatience in the committee over the fact that most of the witnesses appearing to discuss the new revenue legislation have come with plans for exemption from war taxation. E. M. Martin of Omaha, who is

representing mutual life insurance companies, said these companies, which are not operated for profit, should be classed with fraternal societies and savings banks, and should be exempt from federal income taxes. He suggested, in lieu of all other taxes, a tax of an equivalent to 1 per cent of the entire collection for expenses of each company. He said the tax of 80 cents per \$1,000 on new business was burdensome.


