BOUT CALLED BY RAIN; TO RESUME SATURDAY NIGHT

Peters-Pesek Match Goes 40 Minutes Without Fal. When Jupiter Pluvious Crabs Act.

Called by Rain

The Pesek-Peters wrestling match at Rourke park yesterday afternoon was called on account of rain at the end of 40 minutes of wrestling, in which there was no fall.

The match will be held Saturday evening at 6:45 o'clock at Rourke park. Seat checks held by spectators at yesterday's match will be honored at the park Saturday night.

Called on account of rain. That was the verdict in the wrestling match between John Pesek of Shelton and Charlie Peters of Papillion at Rourke park yesterday afternoon.

The grapplers had struggled for 40 minutes without a fall when the rain began to fall so hard that Referee Charlie Sherman of Lincoln called time. Then when the downpour ceased no symptoms of easing up was visible, the match was called off for the night.

The match will be resumed Saturday evening at 6:45 at Rourke park, it was announced. Tickets issued for yesterday's match will be honored Saturday night. Seat checks from yesterday's bout also will be good.

Staged in Rain. The entire 40 minutes of wrestling was staged in a drizzling rain. This made it more than difficult for the grapplers in addition to the fact that they and the referee were taking long chances with pneumonia, but they continued their tussle. When the drizzle turned into a deluge, though, they were forced to suspend activities.

Pesek had much the better of the argument during the 40 minutes. He was on the offensive from the start and went behind Peters several times. Once with a scissors hold Pesek almost flattened Peters' shoulders to the mat.

Peters waits. Peters' supporters, however, pointed out that Charlie's game was to let Pesek do the leading for the first 30 minutes and that this discounts Peters' aggressiveness.

Tom Ray defeated Jess Queen in 21 minutes in a preliminary match and a young pretim Iver Remington and Young Gotch wrestled a 30-minute draw. The prelims were staged on the rain the same as the main bout.

About 1,000 wrestling fans were on hand to see the match. The rain apparently kept most of the fans away.
