

TEUTON TREATY SCRAP OF PAPER, ESTHONIA FINDS

Charge German Dictatorship
in Baltic Province Estab-
lished Despite Terms
Made at Brest-Litovsk.

Stockholm, July 11.—Representatives now in Copenhagen of the Esthonian diet, and government have protested to Germany against Germany's occupation policy and oppression in that Baltic province. Mr. Morris, the American minister to Sweden, has sent to President Wilson a copy of the protest, which declares:
"Despite the assurances of Count von Hertling, the German imperial chancellor, and the terms of the Brest-Litovsk treaty, Germany has established a military dictatorship in Esthonia. Before the entrance of German troops, Esthonian troops had re-established order in most districts, but the Germans disarmed these troops, suspended the government, took all the functions into their own hands and created advisory committees composed of German residents, who do not compose more than 2 per cent of the population.
"German has been introduced as the official language, although it is not understood by 90 per cent of the people."
"By means of unscrupulous penalties the Germans have suppressed free speech and political activity. Those newspapers which have been allowed to continue publication have been compelled to publish pro-German propaganda. Prominent Esthonians who modestly protested against the oppression have been arrested."
"In conclusion, the declaration protests against Germany 'plundering the country, seizing foodstuffs to such an extent that the native population is left to starve, while German soldiers send double rations to Germany.'"
Russ Despise Teutons.
Amsterdam, July 11.—Describing conditions in Petrograd as told him by a German doctor, the correspondent at Kiev of the Weser Zeitung says the Russian middle classes do not want a monarchy. Neither do they want bolshevism. What they want is to retain certain things won by the revolution.
Germans, the correspondent says he was told by the doctor, were highly disliked, though more German is heard on the Nevski Prospect than ever. Petrograd, adds the correspondent, is a picture of chaos in which only one feature stands out clearly: Antipathy to Germany.
