

REGISTRANTS IN DRAFT SHOULD BE GIVEN LEGAL AID

"It is Duty of Lawyers," Says Crowder; Unpatriotic and Unethical to Accept Fees.

"The practice of attorneys charging selective service registrants fees is deemed improper, unethical and unpatriotic. It is a form of profiteering beneath the dignity of the legal profession, which has almost unanimously strongly condemned it."

This is the opinion of Provost Marshal General Crowder, given to the adjutant general of Montana in the case of a Montana attorney accepting fees for assisting a draft registrant in filling out his necessary papers. It is being copied by state provost marshals and given as a warning to all lawyers, board members, justices of the peace and notaries public.

A Lawyer's Duty.
"The selective service act exacts from certain citizens their entire time and possibly their lives," declares General Crowder in his statement.

"In that law much was expected from the lawyers. As the selective service regulations state 'it should be the pride of every lawyer that no registrant within his district is without competent legal advice. All lawyers should regard it as their duty to identify themselves with the advisory boards and without compensation to give their services to the nation.'"

"The pleading of the deierred claims of registrants by attorneys is considered culpable and inconsistent with the spirit of the act. The American Bar association has actively assisted this office in discouraging this. The Missouri State Bar association suspended a member for 15 months for exacting fees in administering oaths required for registrants."

Salvation Army Workers Must All Carry Cards

A gray-haired man driving a covered wagon and asserting he is a member of the Salvation Army has been soliciting for the Red Cross in Dundee. Thursday afternoon a traffic officer called on Ensign Walter Grantham of the Salvation Army, saying a woman in Dundee had reported that this man had called on her for help. The woman says she has frequently given to the Salvation Army and they have always sent a truck out for supplies, which fact she mentioned to the old man. "Yes, ma'am," he replied, "we have a truck, but it is broken and so I have to use the wagon." Ensign Grantham states that the Salvation Army uses a truck for collecting supplies and that this gray-haired man is not a member of the Army. "Our men carry cards showing that they are authorized to collect for us," said the ensign, "and if people will ask them to display their cards when they call they will be protected from giving to imposters."

Capt. Kline Writes of War Work of Salvation Army

In the July 13 issue of the War Cry, the official organ of the Salvation Army, there is an article by Captain H. H. Kline, formerly of Omaha. Also a large picture, showing him addressing an immense crowd of soldiers. Captain Kline left Omaha last September to become an army chaplain, and is now stationed at Camp Deming. He has the rank of second lieutenant in the United States army. In this article Captain Kline tells of the denominational indifference of most of the soldiers. The captain appreciated the cowboy's attitude, as he was a Texas cowboy himself before joining the Salvation Army.

Junior Red Cross Girls Called Out for Saturday

At the request of the senior organization of the Red Cross Superintendent Beveridge is issuing an emergency call for seventh and eighth grade girls to make button holes Saturday, June 13, at 8 o'clock a. m. in the council chamber of the city hall. "We want 150 girls," said Mr. Beveridge. "Bring with you a thumbtack and button hole scissors if you have them. If you have neither and can make button holes, come. This is a call to the members of the Junior Red Cross. Credit will be given for crosses for this work."

Bishop Stuntz to Visit Missions of the Orient

Bishop Homer C. Stuntz of the Methodist church Friday applied to the clerk of the federal court for a passport to Japan, China, Malaysia, India, Korea and the Philippines. The bishop has passed 18 years in foreign missionary service in India, the Philippines and South America. He is now 60 years old and wishes to inspect the missionary posts in the foreign lands.

Korea is the only place on his itinerary which he has not yet visited. Mrs. Stuntz will accompany her husband on the trip. They will leave Omaha September 20, and will sail from San Francisco on the steamship Equador.

Newsboys to Celebrate French Holiday at Lake; Proceeds for Orphans

With other features of their 27th annual reunion and picnic at Manawa park Sunday the 1,000 past and present newsboys of Omaha will celebrate the French "Fourth of July." French music, martial and popular; an abundance of French flags, an address on the merits of our ally will mark the event.

The newsboys will sell buttons bearing the flags of the American-French alliance and turn the proceeds over to the fund for French orphans. By giving a continuous vaudeville performance and by collections to be taken by Red Cross girls when Mrs. G. V. Fishbaugh and "Joe the Glazier" of Omaha stage spectacular diving and swimming exhibitions at the water front, the newsboys hope to raise enough to buy an automobile with which the Omaha Red Cross chapter can collect salvage.

Judges of the Douglas county district court will speak at the afternoon program. Finn's concert band will play concerts, afternoon and evening, of mostly French music. Adams' Jazz band will play all the day. Rome Miller, prominent Omahan and former newsboy, will talk. Rabbi Bernstein of St. Joseph, Mo., an ex-Omaha newsboy, will speak. The boys will meet at Sixteenth and Farnam streets at 12:30 o'clock and parade five blocks to the chartered street cars.

Location of City Ticket Offices Not Yet Decided

The consolidation of the railroad city ticket offices in Lincoln will become effective August 1, according to L. W. Wakeley, chairman of the committee. The location is the Burlington city office, Thirteenth and O streets and T. W. Bonnell, city passenger agent of the Burlington will be in charge, with the title of agent. The roads that go into the office under the consolidation plan are the Burlington, Union Pacific, Northwestern, Rock Island and Missouri Pacific.

In Denver the consolidation of offices is under way, the rooms occupied by the Santa Fe having been selected.

The location of the Omaha office is held up awaiting word from Chicago as to which rooms in the Union Pacific building will be accepted. It is said that here there is going to be considerable difficulty in finding enough ticket sellers to handle the business. In Lincoln, employment is to be given to 10 and it is figured that to handle the business in the Omaha office will require fully double that number.
