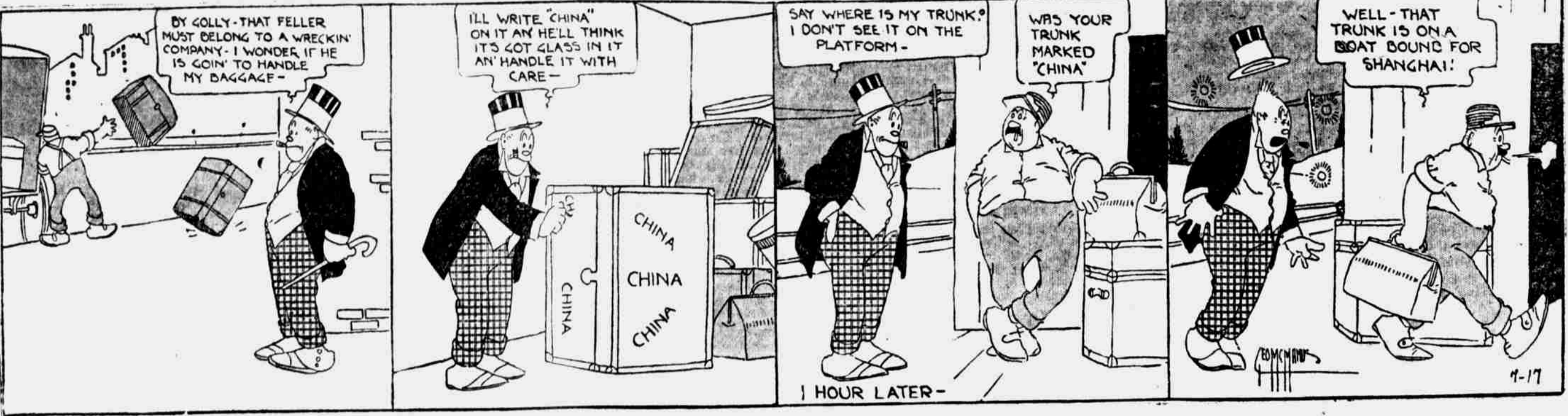

GOLF RECORD BROKEN WHEN CRACKS COMPETE

WALTER HAGEN MAKES COURSE WITH EASE IN 71

Professional Establishes New Mark for Omaha Courses in Red Cross Golf at Happy Hollow.

Shattering the record of 74 for the Happy Hollow and of 72 for Omaha and playing one of the most wonderful games of golf ever seen in Omaha, Walter Hagen, professional golfer, won the exhibition four-square played on the Happy Hollow course yesterday afternoon for the benefit of the Red Cross with a low score of 71. The total was far below that which was expected and was a surprise to many local fans with whom "Chick" Evans, Hagen's partner, was a favorite. Beautiful long drives and careful approaches marked Hagen's playing. Keeping a low score from the first two holes, on Hagen had the score of 34 at the completion of the rounds out. Each of the other three players used 37 strokes on the outward course.

Evans Favorite of Stands. "Chick" Evans, the favorite, finished next and one notch below the record for the course. Evans had hard luck at times but his playing fell far short of equalling his wizard partner. Hagen was the only player making a hole with two strokes. He accomplished this feat on the second green which was 133 yards. Bob McDonald, professional player from the Indian Hill club of Chicago, taking the place of Warren Wood who was ill, also exhibited his worth as a low tallier. McDonald made several miraculous strokes which drew hearty applause. At one time McDonald's ball rolled into a creek. Using a niblick, he successfully extracted it and placed it in the green. At another time when the ball was lost in the weeds of a water hazard, the Scotch player sent the new ball from a difficult position in the weeds to the green. Jock Hutchinson, who was paired with McDonald, completed the course in 76. On the way out he made the first, second and sixth holes in three but failed to equal his playing on the inward course.

Players Start Late. Playing started more than an hour after scheduled time. Hutchinson opened the big event by driving off. His sphere landed well in the green. Evans placed his in the center. Hutchinson and Hagen holed in their third shot and McDonald and Evans coaxed the ball in the pot on their fourth stroke. Hutchinson and McDonald landed well in the second green patch and Hagen put the ball in the hole on the approach, making the lowest score for one hole so far and missed the hole, retreating a fourth shot. The 306 yards to the third hole proved a Jonah for Hutchinson, who required six strokes to make connections. Rain Threatens. The velocity of the wind suddenly increased at this time, but did not seriously affect the playing. Blue spots began to appear in the rain-threatening sky. Evans drove into a trap and McDonald had a mean approach at the fourth hole. Hutchinson went in on his fourth stroke and the others on the following one. The fifth hole was played in par by all. McDonald, who had one off stroke, failed to negotiate the next 27 yards in par as the other three did. The seventh hole proved the undoing of Hutchinson, who first drove out of bounds and then failed to drive to the green. The distance was the longest on the course and required seven shots by Hutchinson and five by the others. Pretty driving marked the course to the next hole. All players were requested to heed a "stop, look and moisten" sign and push a cup of aqua pura which Red Cross assistants served at a jitney a glass. Jack Hutchinson shone at this time, following a good drive with two neat strokes which gave him the low score of three for the hole. Hagen drew applause from the crowd on his long drive to the last hole. All save Hutchinson made it in three. The first nine holes ended with

Hagen the low man with a total of 34 and the other three tied with a 37 tally. Hagen fell under even the par score of 37 which the others equaled. Bogey score was 42. On the first hole in McDonald drove his ball into the creek, but skillfully extracted it with his niblick. His aim at the hole was slightly off, so he was thus forced to make seven shots to put his ball in. The others also missed connecting with the hole but made it in par. Two straight long drives by Hagen and Evans marked the march to the eleventh hole.

Thirteen Proves Jinx. Hagen placed his sphere on the 13th green on his first shot, but needed three more to put it in. The 13th division proved a second jinx to McDonald, who lost his ball in the weeds of a water hazard. A ball, believed to be his, was found and put to the green. The shot was exceedingly difficult and was made with such skill that the crowd burst into applause. When a second ball was found and the first proved to be an old ball lost, the feat was repeated with even better success. McDonald made the low score in the next hole, in trying for which Evans and Hutchinson made bad approaches. The march to the 15th hole was marked by the driving of the winning pair. Chick Evans got into a depression on the way to the 16th, but made the hole in three. McDonald holed a neat one and Hagen fell short.

Evans alone succeeded in gaining the green on his drive to the 17th. The others had trouble in holing and took four shots in all. The final 430 yards was completed at about 6:35. Because of the long distance, the balls fell to the side of the green. Each player finished the hole in five. Evans had the low score of 36 in with his partner following with 37. McDonald totaled 38 in and Hutchinson 39. The Score Cards.

Notes of the Tournament

A complimentary dinner was given the players at the club following the match. Red Cross booths did a great business selling the Missouri non-intoxicating beverage at a jitney a shot. Souvenir score cards containing the pictures of the players were sold by the Red Cross at a quarter each.

Much pooling was going on to swell the Red Cross total. Bets were also made for amounts ranging from \$5 to \$100.

A pocketbook with several large bills was lost on the course. If not identified, it will be given to the Red Cross.

The players put on the soft pedal when they missed fire, but nevertheless gave several whoops that indicated their feelings.

A crowd of about 1,000 persons witnessed the auction and about half that number were on hand when the 18 holes were completed.

"I'd give \$200 myself to carry his clubs for him," said one Omaha miss while cad-dying rights for Hagen were being auctioned off.

"Now here's McDonald's golf ball; you all know Mac, he's the best of the lot," called out Auctioneer Parrish, while Mac's already bronzed face blushed a deep crimson.

"O-O-O-h-h-h" came as if from one voice from the group of women and girls as Walter Hagen made his first shot and the ball sailed off through the air over the hill.

S. R. McKelvie's bid of \$250, later raised to \$300, for the privilege of caddying for Chick Evans, warmed the hearts of the crowd to the Lincoln man. "You're there, Mack," came from one corner of the crowd.

loosen the pursestrings of the large crowd and bids and counterbids were banded back and forth across the club house lawn.

McKelvie Is Caddy. S. R. McKelvie took the honors of the day with the highest bid, \$350, for the privilege of acting as Chick Evans' caddy. "What am I offered for caddying for Chick Evans?" sang out Auctioneer John W. Parrish. "One hundred dollars," came from a voice in the crowd. "Two hundred fifty," from Mr. McKelvie took away the breath of the crowd. The bid jumped to \$300 and was raised to \$350 by Mr. McKelvie. After several calls of "Going, going, GONE!" the auctioneer called, "sold to Mr. McKelvie for \$350," and the crowd applauded its approval.

Other high bids were \$175, paid by Judge William A. Redick for Chick Evans' golf ball, \$110 paid by Dr. William J. Bradbury for Jock Hutchinson's golf ball, \$100 for caddying for Walter Hagen, paid by Albert Cahn, \$105 paid by P. Duque de Estrada for caddying for Jock Hutchinson, and several bids of \$100 for golf balls and caddying privileges.

Parrish As Auctioneer. And Auctioneers Parrish and E. H. Sprague were not at all backward in their efforts at drawing forth the money for the nursing of the soldier boys. "You can't hear me, Harry, I know, but you've got money just the same," he called to one man in the crowd. "Let's raise the bid \$15," he said after the first or second round. And the money came, too, and faster after the ante had been raised then before.

The bidding began briskly after the crowd was once warmed up. The first offering was a small statue of the Red Cross. "The Greatest Mother on Earth." First bids were for \$5 and \$10. Chick Evans drew a hand when he raised the bid to \$30 himself. It was finally sold to Guy Liggett for \$35.

Redick Buys Golf Ball. The golf balls were next auctioned off. The winner of the first bid was to get his choice of the golf balls of any of the four players. Judge William A. Redick raised the bid three times before he finally secured it. Bidding began at \$5, and the bids were gradually raised to \$50. Judge Redick raised to \$65. Dr. Bradbury raised from \$75 to \$100. Judge Redick countered with \$100. When the bid went to \$125, O. D. Kiplinger raised it to \$150, and Judge Redick settled matters by calling out \$175.

Bidding for the choice of numbers for the scores to be made by the different players brought out some lively rivalry and the numbers were quickly disposed of.

P. F. Paulson paid \$5 for the right to choose 75 as Rob McDonald's score. Second, third and fourth choices went at \$10 each. Fifth choice went at \$15 and A. E. Houghton paid \$40 for the field, all the rest of the numbers. W. J. Foye bought the field for Chick Evans' score for \$16 after first choice had gone for \$10, and second and third choice had gone for \$5 each. Twenty-five per cent of the money in each pool went to the Red Cross and 75 per cent to the winner.

Desudnes' band furnished music before the bidding began and in between bids. The "Star Spangled Banner" opened the ceremonies. By 3:30 o'clock all was over and the crowd adjourned to the links to see Chick Evans and Walter Hagen play Rob McDonald and Jock Hutchinson.

Over 500 entries have been received at \$5 each for participation in the state golf tourney, which was interrupted Tuesday by the exhibition match between the stars.
