Claar, head of the Claar Transfer company, Council Bluffs and Omaha. is in the Edmundson hospital suffering from injuries that may prove fatal, inflicted when a steel carbonic acid gas tank exploded. The accident happened late Thursday afternoon at Treynor, 12 miles from Coun-

Young Claar had taken a truck load of merchandise to Treynor for delivery to merchants. Among the articles was a freezer of ice cream and the soda fountain tank for the H. A. Rohlf restaurant. Claar had backed the auto truck to the curb and had ark, Ill.; Joseph Cole, Lynn, Mass.; lifted the ice cream from the truck Harry Snively, Schellburg, Pa. and had turned to carry it into the store when the tank exploded.

The plate glass front and the whole corner of the store were blown out and Claar was blown into the wreckage. His clothes were nearly all torn from his body, only the waistband of his overalls and trousers remaining. The flying glass and debris from the building injured several persons inside, one boy, 10 years old. named Maas, severely. The wrecked tank shot upward more than 400 feet and fell on the Treynor garage a block away, smashing a section of the roof and tearing out a corner of

by Dr. Stevens, Treynor physician, and the boy's parents notified. They drove quickly to the village, accompanied by Dr. Treynor. The physician said there were no seriously contused wounds and the boy appeared to be suffering from shell shock.


