

HOWELL ENTERS FIGHT FOR SEAT IN STATE HOUSE

Manager of Water Board Announces Candidacy for Governor; Robert Smith to Manage Campaign.

R. B. Howell, general manager of the Metropolitan Water board, and republican national committeeman for Nebraska, has announced his intention to file for the gubernatorial nomination.

He stated that his petition has been sent to Lincoln.

Robert Smith, clerk of the district court, will be Mr. Howell's campaign manager.

"I will not conduct an extensive campaign, but expect to make a few automobile speaking tours; I will continue in the service of the water district as general manager and will ask for a leave of absence for such time as I may be out of the city during the primary campaign," Mr. Howell stated.

He made the race for governor in 1914, running against Ross Hammond of Fremont and J. H. Kemp of Fullerton for the republican nomination. In the final he was defeated by John H. Morehead, who had a plurality of 19,000 over Howell and Sackett.

Press Public Ownership. Mr. Howell states that during his forthcoming primary campaign he will emphasize public ownership, either co-operative or compulsory, as he did in his 1914 campaign.

Frank Harrison of Lincoln, who is interested in the candidacy of Senator Norris, has been in Omaha this week and conferred with Mr. Howell in the latter's office at several night meetings.

"I expect Mr. Harrison's support," was Mr. Howell's comment on those meetings.

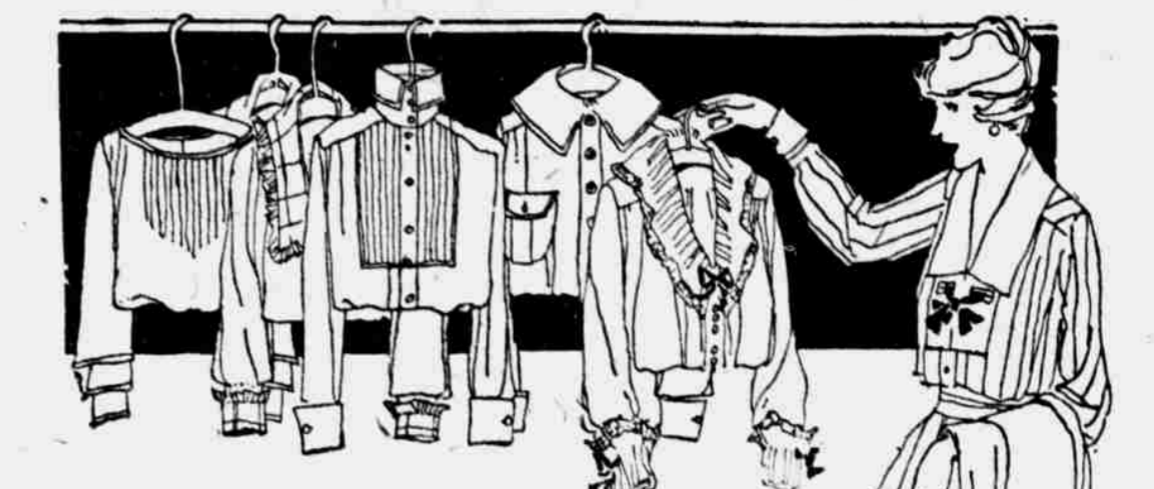

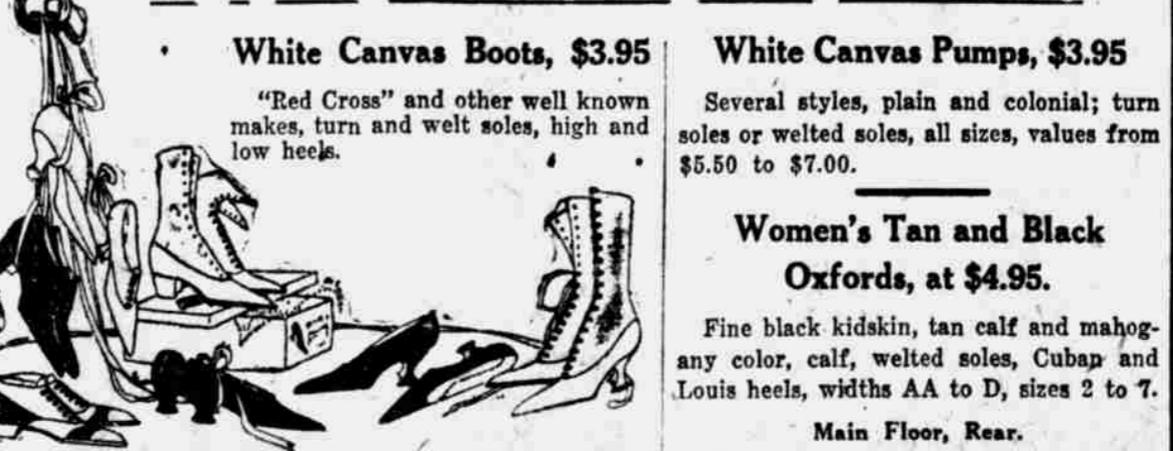
