# **HOWELL ENTERS** FIGHT FOR SEAT IN STATE HOUSE

Manager of Water Board Announces Candidacy for Governor: Robert Smith to Manage Campaign.

R. B. Howell, general manager of the Metropolitan Water board, and republican national committeeman for Nebraska, has announced his intention to file for the gubernatorial nomination.

He stated that hi petition has been sent to Lincoln.

Robert Smith, clerk of the district court, will be Mr. Howell's campaign manager.

"I vill not conduct an extensive campaign, but expect to make a few automobile speaking tours; I will continue in the service of the water district as general manager and will ask for a leave of absence for such time as I may be out of the city during the primary campaign," Mr. Howell stated

He made the race for governor in 1914, running against Ross Ham-mond of Fremont and J. H. Kemp of Fullerton for the republic nomination. In the finals he was defeated by John H. Morehead, who had a plurality of 19,000 over Howell and Sackett.




