Authorities in Omaha Not On Still Hunt for Bergdoll

Omaha police and federal authorities disclaim any extraordinary vigilance is being exerted in searching for Grover C. Bergdoll, Philadelphia millionaire sportsman who is wanted in the Quaker city as an evader of the draft, as reported in an Omaha evening paper Thursday.

Marshal Eberstein, chief of the department of justice bureau in Omaha, declares he has only received the regular form circular that Bergdoll is wanted as a deserter, and that he is merely pursuing the regular policy of the office in searching for draft evaders with regard to him.

May Hold Back Jaws. To the cool judgment of army officers, however, the situation did not warrant, on the basis of any information available at a late hour tonight, the assumption that the time had come when the jaws of Foch's great vise might be crushed together.

Fear Felt for U. S. Ambassador Francis At Vologda, Russia. Washington, July 25.—No word has been received directly from Ambassador Francis in Russia since July 11, and there is a feeling of apprehension in official circles here regarding his position in view of the latest turn of affairs.

British Engineers Indorse Munition Workers' Strike. Leeds, England, July 25.—At a conference of members of the engineering and allied trades today, with delegates present representing 300,000 workers, it was decided to cease work next Tuesday if the embargo is not removed.
