

SOUTH SIDE STOCKMEN AWAIT LICENSES FROM FEDERAL BOARD

Dealers Continue Business Despite Failure of Permits to Arrive; Will Have Slight Effect.

Yesterday was the day on which all packing plants, commission men, cattle traders, and all persons connected with the live stock trade were to come under federal license. Stockmen on the South Side, however, are wondering where their licenses are. "Business as usual" has been agreed upon by the puzzled live stock dealers who, according to the regulations as made and provided, are liable to punishment for doing business without a license.

The act was passed June 18 and applications were made for the licenses several weeks ago. They were entered by the food administration at Washington, after a call for suggestions and changes in the regulations had been made.

Restrictions imposed by the regulations will not change local business since they are made with the intent to help live stock business as much as possible. The licenses are regarded as a matter of form and business is running smooth without them. Thousands of licenses will have to be filled out so local dealers are patiently awaiting theirs and continuing to fill orders despite the omission.

Heavy penalties will soon be inflicted on seven registrants of the exemption board, No. 2, South Side, unless these men appear immediately before Chairman J. I. McLeroy, general delivery; Joseph Green, 2516 N street; Leon Roberts, 1316 Drexel street; Pere August Johnson, 2511 A street; Bertis S. Counts, 2510 L street; and Herbert Bonner, 2826 Q street.

Fifteen more men will be inducted into service to fill the places of men rejected after reaching the training camps. Ten will be sent to Camp Funston Tuesday and five to Fort Riley.

A. Mullen of Albion Tops South Side Hog Market

The top of the hog market went to A. Mullen, a butcher and feeder from Albion, yesterday when his shipment of 65 pigs sold for \$18.80. The porkers averaged 222 pounds. Mr. Mullen has marketed eight loads of live stock this year and topped the market twice.

"The corn crop through our section of the country looks good, but is suffering for the want of a good rain," said Mr. Mullen. "The wheat and oats harvest has been finished and the yield is very satisfactory to all. The wheat, however, is nearly an average crop this year, while the oats crop is splendid in quality, but 'meek' in quantity."

Kansas City Stock Yards Manager Visits Omaha

W. H. Weeks, general manager of the Kansas City stock yards visited the Omaha yards Thursday. After spending the day at the yards he left Omaha last night. "Live stock and crop prospects in the west and southwest are most promising," said Mr. Weeks. "Our people are making a most effective answer to the Kaiser's threat of starving Europe into submission."

American farmers and stock raisers are doing their share in winning the war by decreasing the number of piggy sows shipped to market and thus increasing hog production. The number of piggy sows in an average shipment is now about six-tenths of 1 per cent.

Conspiracy Charge Is Dropped by Court Order

The case of the United States against W. A. Eddy, C. L. White and C. M. Eaton, charged with conspiracy to make fraudulent use of the mails in persuading Lew N. St. John to invest in stock of the Omaha Cut Glass Manufacturing company, was terminated suddenly Thursday afternoon when on motion of the attorneys for the defense the court instructed the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty.

It was argued that Eaton, alleged to have carried on the correspondence with St. John on which the indictment was based, only stated in the letters what had been stated to him by Eddy and White and that he did not know of his own knowledge that the statements were false, if they were in fact false.

On behalf of Eddy and White the court stated that as the overt acts in the matter of using the mails had been committed by Eaton, who had no guilty knowledge of false representations, there was no way to connect the other defendants with the alleged misuse of the mail. The evidence, he stated, had not borne out the contention of a conspiracy in the legal sense.
