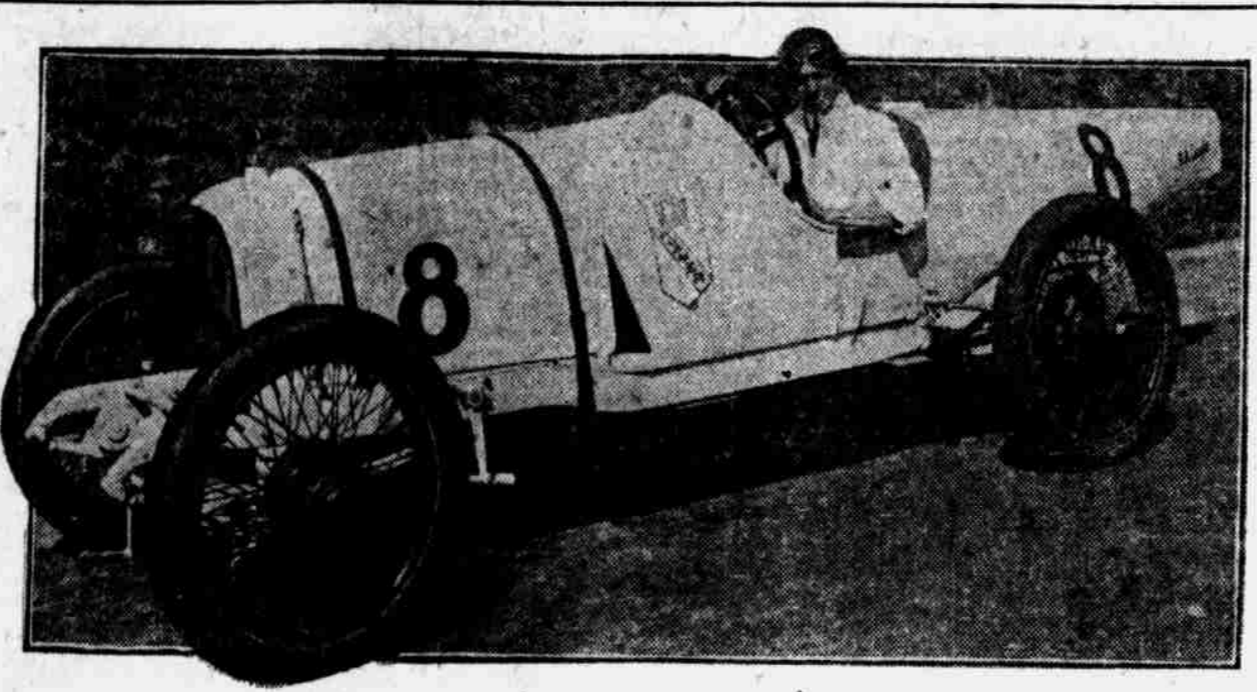

Taxes on Autos and Gasoline Planned by House Committee

Washington, July 31.—A federal graduated excise tax on the use of automobiles running from \$10 a year on cars originally retailed at not exceeding \$500 to a \$60 tax on \$3,000 cars and \$20 additional for each \$500 above \$3,000 was agreed to by the house ways and means committee, which is framing the \$8,000,000,000 revenue bill.

The committee also agreed to a tax of two cents per gallon on the production of gasoline and a federal excise tax of \$5 a year on the use of motorcycles.

Members of the committee stated that while the manufacturers' tax and the owners' tax are differentiated, it is generally believed that the owners ultimately will have to pay all the tax, the manufacturers passing on the tax in increased prices.
