Soon afterward, other reports were circulated which put the present condition of corn throughout the United States six points lower than on July 1. In view of such advices, the prevailing sentiment continued decidedly builish throughout the session. Sales to realize profits caused moderate reactions at intervals, but the offerings were readily absorbed. The fact that arrivals here hardly exceeded 120 cars was

arrivals here hardly exceeded 120 cars was an additional strengthening factor toward the last. Oats derived firmness chiefly from corn. Selling by cash houses held the advance in check.

Interest in the provision market was the smallest in many weeks. The fact that values were near the maximum deterred buyers, notwithstanding expected disclosure of a decrease of stocks.
