Washington, Aug. 23.-Payments to the allies since the United States entered the war today stood at \$6,089,064,750. This represents the aggregate of checks paid, as distinguished from credits established, which now amount to \$6,692,040,000. All credit accounts are being drawn on periodically by the governments to which they are extended, excepting that to Russia, which has an unexpended balance of \$137,000,000. Technically, this is still available, but the bolshevik government has never presented any demands for payment.
