

Bolshevik Leaders Flee. Washington, Aug. 26 .- Nearly all the bolshevik leaders have left Petrograd and Moscow and it is almost impossible to see those who are left, according to information reaching the State department today through Stockholm from a man who left Petrograd August 13. He reported Lenine, the bolshevik premier, on a battleship at Kronstadt and Trotzky aboard the former Emperor Nicholas' yacht a short distance below Petro-

grad. This report is denied by the Swedish press, but the department's informant said it was current when he left Petrograd. His message told also of a meeting held at Kronstadt in an endeavor to get the soldiers there to agree to fight against the Czecho-Slovaks. There were about 7,000 soldiers present to hear an address by Trotzky, but it was intimated that most of them could not be persuaded to move against the Czechs.



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
