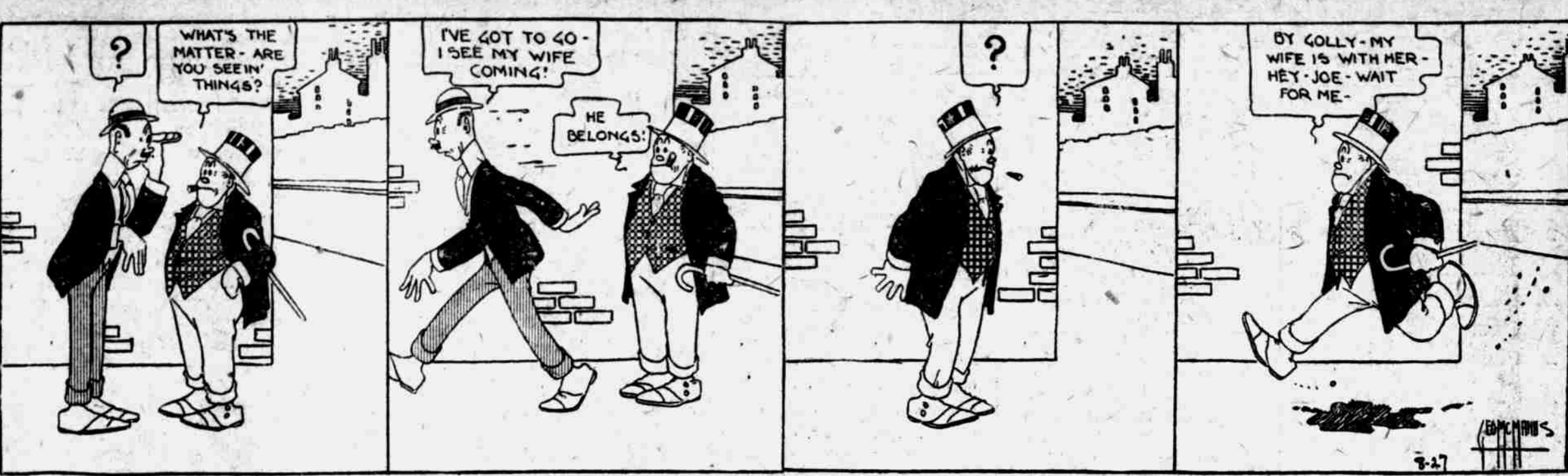
Woman's 880-Yard World's Swimming Record Broken
