Royal Mac Wins Straight Victory in 2:06 Trot; Director J. Beaten by Adioo Guy in Pace.

Columbus, O., Sept. 17.—Grand circuit racing began here today on a slow track because of heavy rains of Monday and cloudy skies today up until noon.

Blind, in the 2:06 trot, met with his first defeat of the season on the big line. He was not up to his speed and Royal Mac won a straight heat victory. Blind could get no better than third money. Blind sold for \$100 to the field's \$150 in the early betting. The fastest heat was trotted in 2:09 1/4.

Director J., who has not been defeated since the second North Randall Grand Circuit meeting took a beating in the King stake, purse \$3,000, for 2 1/2 pacers, by Adioo Guy, 2:01 to 1 shot from the half-mile tracks.

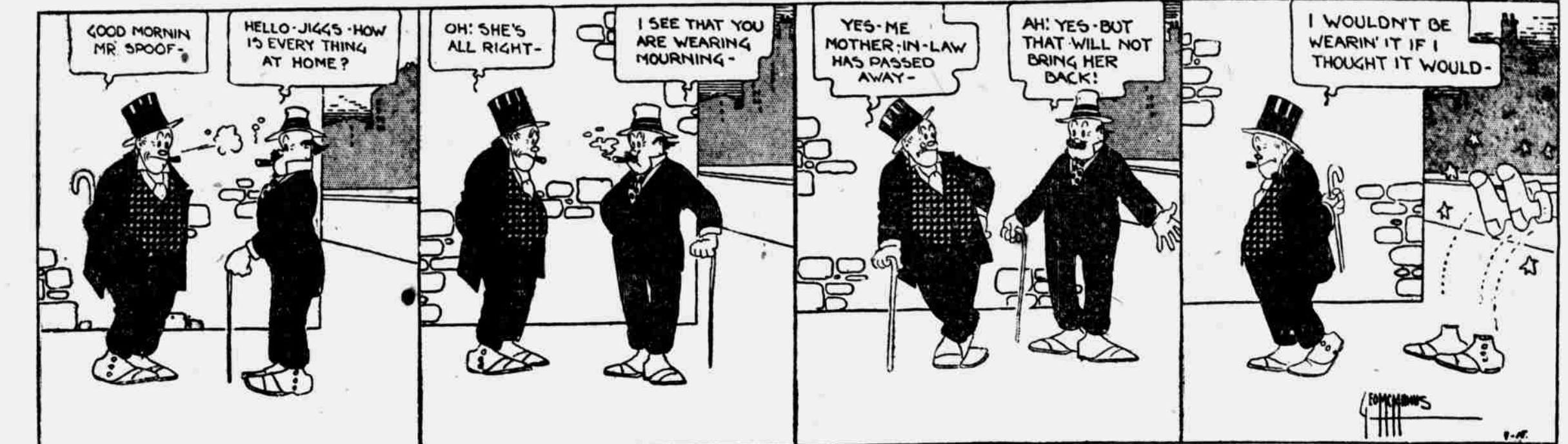
War Work Campaign Leaders Will Meet Here on Wednesday

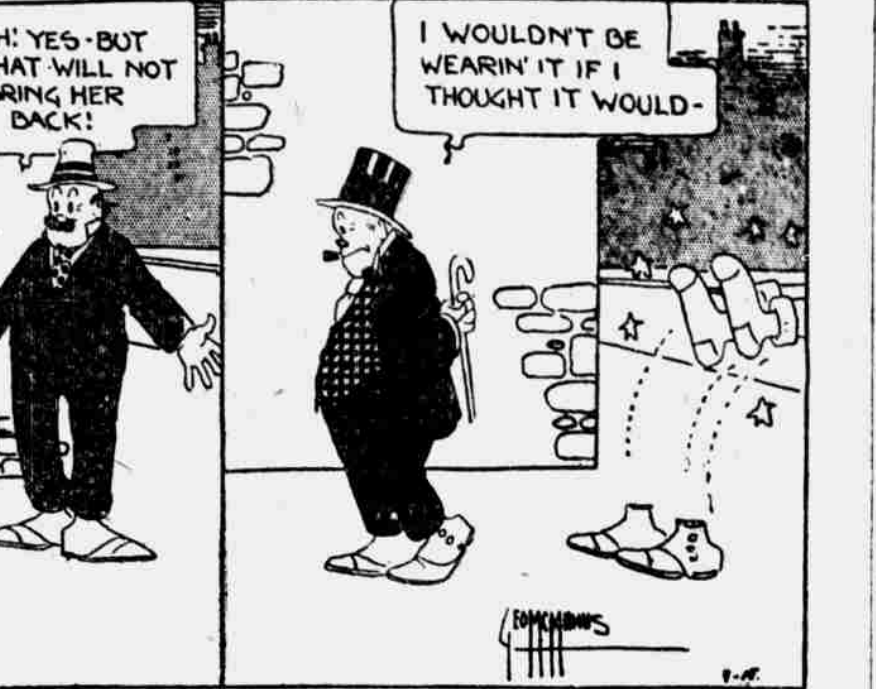
