

MILITARY ZONE LIMIT RAISED TO TEN-MILE RADIUS

Restricted Area is Increased by New Army Order as Aid to Morale of Soldiers.

Lieutenant McLaughlin of the United States public health service has transmitted to Superintendent Ringer of the police department a copy of new orders issued by Secretary Baker of the War Department in connection with protecting soldiers from immoral influences. The restricted zone has been increased to a radius of 10 miles of all camps, cantonments, forts, posts and other rendezvous of the army and navy.

The new regulations "in support of the policy of absolute repression of prostitution in the vicinity of army and navy camps" follow:

Extended.
Within a radius of 10 miles of all army and navy camps, stations, posts, forts, etc., prostitution or the aiding or abetting of it in any way is declared unlawful. Hereafter the zone shall be five miles in width. The change is significant, because many important camps and stations are located more than five miles from the nearest large city.

The new regulations were agreed upon at a conference held by representatives of the War and Navy departments, the Department of Justice, and of the training camp commissions.

The following regulations are established by the secretary of war, to continue during the present emergency, and shall supersede all former regulations issued under the aforesaid authority:

1. Ten miles from any military camp, station, fort, post, cantonment, training or mobilization place, as the distance determined to be needful to the efficiency and welfare of the army, within which it shall be unlawful to engage in prostitution or to aid or abet prostitution or to procure or solicit for purposes of prostitution or to receive any person for purposes of lewdness, assignation, or prostitution in any vehicle, conveyance, place, structure or building, or to permit any person to remain for purposes of lewdness, assignation, or prostitution in any vehicle, conveyance, place, structure, or building.

Rule to Be Enforced.
2. To suppress and prevent violation of the aforesaid act, within 10 miles of any military camp, station, fort, post, cantonment, training or mobilization place, directing, taking, or transporting, or offering to take or transport, any person, for immoral purposes, to, or assisting in any means any person for such purposes to find, any prostitute or any house of ill fame, brothel, or bawdy house, with knowledge or reasonable cause to know of the character of the person or house, is hereby prohibited.

3. To suppress and prevent violation of the aforesaid act, within 10 miles of any military camp, station, fort, post, cantonment, training or mobilization place, entering or residing in, for immoral purposes, and house of ill fame, brothel, or bawdy house, is hereby prohibited.

4. All prior violations of former regulations and all penalties incurred thereunder shall be prosecuted and entered in the same manner and with the same effect as if these superseding regulations had not been established.

Injunction is Claimed Ignored in Troubles of Degree of Honor

The legal conflict between members of Washington lodge No. 27 Degree of Honor, Ancient Order of United Workmen, and its former grand chief of honor, Mayme Hedrich Cleaver, has produced another angle that resulted Friday morning in the filing of an application for attachment against Mrs. Cleaver, Emma L. Thorpe, Katie Schmitt and Mary Long, for disobeying a temporary injunction. Following the filing of the petition in district court, Judge Troup issued an order against the defendants to appear in court on September 30 to show cause why the attachment should not be allowed.

Members of Washington lodge No. 27 allege that Mrs. Cleaver has refused to give their members proper credentials that will allow them to be present at the grand lodge session at Hastings, Neb., on October 9. They allege that Mrs. Cleaver's actions will prevent any delegates of the lodge from attending unless legal action is taken against her.

It is alleged that Mrs. Cleaver and the other defendants have disobeyed the temporary injunction issued against them by Judge Troup on July 3, when they were ordered to restore the charter of Lodge No. 27 and to discontinue taking its members into the newly organized lodge, No. 14, headed by Mrs. Cleaver.
