C. A. Heaton, 2013 Leavenworth street, reported yesterday that \$90 in bills, a receipt from the Omaha Gas company, and also one from the Omaha Van and Storage company, were taken from his person down-town Wednesday night.

As the above described papers correspond with those found on Dave McBride of St. Paul, Minn. arrested at Fifteenth and Farnam streets Wednesday night, police are convinced he is the party who went through Heaton's pockets. Mc-Bride also had about \$250 in currency concealed in inner pockets, and there is little doubt in the opinion of police that Heaton's roll represents a part of that amount.

Arrested with McBride at the time was Isidore Wasser, also of St. Paul, who, it is believed, was working in the crowd at Fifteenth and Farnam with him. Wasser had \$59 when searched.

Both men appear to be experienced "dips," according to the police, and it is believed they belong to a gang which has swooped down upon the city from St. Paul.

Packers Agree to \$18.50 Minimum Price for Hogs

Washington, Oct. 3 .- Although offering vigorous objection to the plan to stabilize the price of hogs as recently proposed by a special investigating committee of the food administration, representatives of the large packing companies and pledged their support to the food administration in the effort to maintain a minimum price of \$18.50 a hundred for hogs during the packing season.

The packers also agreed to maintain the October price for hogs, but to make it more workable it was placed upon the basis of the \$18 average minimum. It is expected that the price will work out so as to guarantee to producers a price of \$18.50 for average droves during October. The packers also will attempt to prevent fluctuations of more than 50 cents a hundred in any


