Billings, Mont., Oct. 5 .- America cannot afford to accept the lead of any party, nor any organization calling itself nonpartisan, but really acting as a party, which is not first

and foremost American, and nothing but American, declared Colonel Theodore Roosevelt here tonight in an address in which he outlined various phases of the war and its many sidelights.

"There are real and grave causes for complaint among the farmers here in the northwest," the former president continued as he read from paper figures which purported to discrepancies in connection the prices paid for wheat and freight rates, but he asserted "Many of the remedies proposare not only false, but mischievus and very grave harm may be caused by the character of the agitation conducted by some of these men who profess to be seeking these remedies.

relief for these conditions would result in nothing but widespread damage. Some of the conditions complained of can be met by state action. There should be federal control of elevators and flour mills with established terminal elevators at convenient points.

I object just as strongly whether such a political organization claims to be in the interest of townspeople, or countrypeople, of merchants, lawyers, farmers or wage earners ..


