

NO SLACKENING IN LOAN DRIVE TO BE SLOGAN

Secretary Rowe Sends Word to Liberty Loan Chairman, Urging Pushing of Campaign.

Liberty loan workers everywhere are expected to go into the campaign with renewed energy today with a view to pushing their respective localities over the top at the earliest possible date.

In his official capacity, Secretary Rowe has sent the following telegram to every Liberty loan chairman in the Tenth district:

We cannot too strongly impress upon you and your people the fact that there must be no slackening of efforts in the Liberty loan campaign on account of the publication of the news of Germany's acceptance of peace terms.

Furthermore, our government has enormous outstanding obligations yet to be met and unless every unit in the loan organization of the Tenth district meets its full obligation we may properly be classified as quitters.

County Chairmen Notified. T. C. Byrne, state chairman, has sent telegrams to all county chairmen in Nebraska who have not yet raised their quotas, urging them to pay no attention to peace notes, and explaining the necessity of subscribing the loan, even if peace were signed at once.

Every Liberty loan worker in Douglas county is urged to keep uppermost in his or her mind the one thought, that Omaha is still \$1,000,000 short of its quota and this week money must be raised this week. Forget war news and peace notes until our task is accomplished.

Sam Burns, chairman of the men's selling force, will issue orders to his workers early this morning to check over their districts carefully, especially firms not displaying Liberty loan emblems, for possible extra subscriptions.

Outdoor vaudeville shows at Sixteenth and Douglas streets will be continued until the campaign is over.

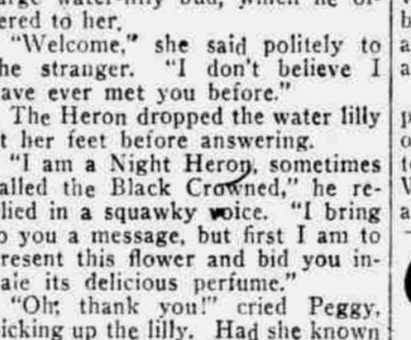
THE WITCH OF THE NIGHT
