

BELGIAN ROADS MAD JUMBLE AS GERMANS FLEE

Foe Hurries to Escape Being Bottled Up as Allied Armies Advance Up Channel Coast.

With the Allied Armies in Belgium, Oct. 18.—The allied infantry made rapid progress today and pierced into the German front beyond Wyngene. The Germans are hurrying eastward through the passage between Bruges and the Dutch border and trying to escape being bottled up. Only one good road exists in this passage, this being from Bruges to Ecclou. It contains a mad jumble of transports and fleeing men.

The Bruges Ecclou road is under fire of the Belgian guns, which also are shelling the back areas, dropping shells into the masses of the fleeing enemy. The passage between Bruges and Holland, which will be made narrower by the advancing troops, undoubtedly will constantly come in for treatment by the heavy artillery as more allied guns are rushed up. The Germans in Belgium already have met with defeat and those fleeing from the coast are faced with the great danger of capture unless they win the race they are making to escape. If the passage is closed the Germans, rather than surrendering, may try to escape by crossing into Holland, where it is sure they would be interned.

One thing stands out above others. The coast of Belgium, so vital to the German submarine operations, is fast being cleared of the enemy. It would appear from reports regarding the cavalry, operating on both sides of Bruges that the horsemen even now are endeavoring to cut off the fleeing enemy.

British Aide Flu Victim. Washington, Oct. 18.—Major, the Hon. Charles Lyell, principal aide to Major General MacLachlan, military attaché of the British embassy, died here today of an embolism following an attack of Spanish influenza. He was the second member of the embassy staff to fall a victim to the scourge, Capt. Angus MacIntosh died Sunday. Major Lyell, though only 43 years of age, had been a member of Parliament and served as parliamentary private secretary to Sir Edward Grey and to Mr. Asquith.

As a soldier he served in France, where he suffered from severe shell shock, which led to his detachment and assignment to Washington. Burial will be at Arlington National cemetery next Monday.

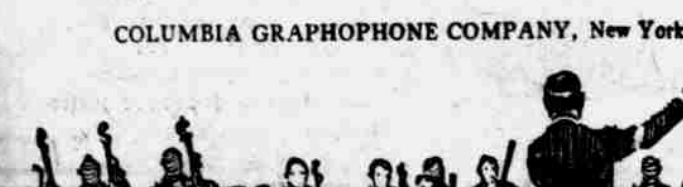

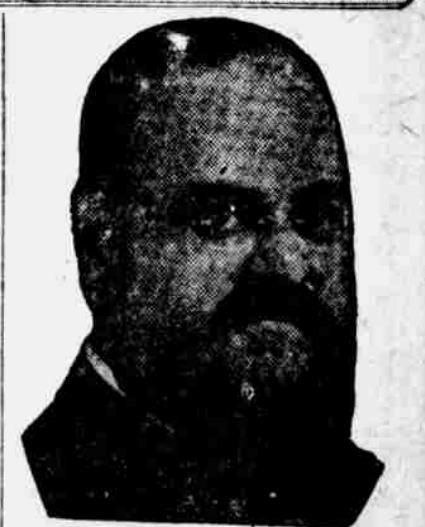
