"FLU" EPIDEMIC IS SUBSIDING IN **MILITARY CAMPS**

Peak Not Yet Reached Among Civilian Population: Half Million Cases in New York City.

Cook Robert J. Ranney, Buffalo, N. Y. Washington, Oct. 19 .- Spanish influenza as an epidemic is subsiding rapidly in the military camps of the country, but among the civilian population generally the peak has not yet been reached. Jack Francis Patrick Clancy, Racine

Conditions in eastern states, where the disease first appeared, showed improvement today, but reports from the south, the middle west and Pacific coast were not optimistic.

New cases in army camps today showed a decrease of 1,403. Pneumonia decreased 298 from yesterday and the number of deaths was 158 less than yesterday, numbering 472. Since the beginning of the epidemic cases reported from camps total 283,331, with 14,153 deaths. Camp McClelland, Alabama, with 344 new cases, led in new cases to-
