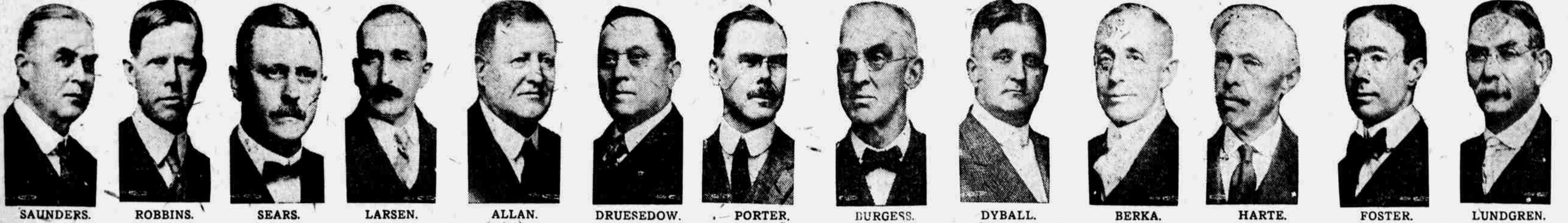

The secretary stated he did not know when war with Germany would end, but asserted, "The salvation of young American manhood as only just begun and it is going to keep up and this means that as long as there is an American soldier, sailor or marine abroad or in home camps, united war work agencies must maintain their present vital activities."

"Special features of the great campaign are now taking final form. Almost 2,000,000 Victory Boys and Victory Girls will be enlisted to work and earn at least \$5 apiece for the fund. This enterprise has the hearty approval of P. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education. "Let every Victory Boy and Victory Girl," says the commissioner, "do all possible to raise this money which is to be given, not through compulsion, but through charity and good will."

"To further the boys' and girls' campaign, 40,000 members of the International Association of Rotary clubs are assisting the young Americans to find tasks whereby they earn money to pay their pledges."

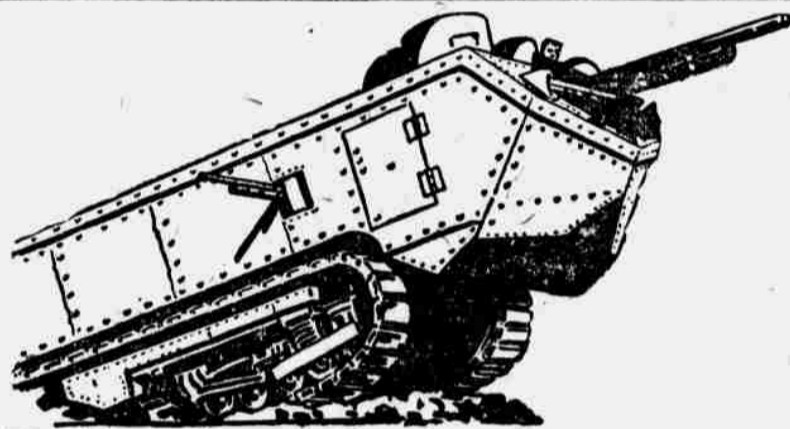
LINCOLN LETTER PRODUCED AIDS WAR WORK DRIVE

Martyred President Praised Things Done to Make Soldiers' Lot More Bearable.

O. H. Menold, local director of the united war work campaign Tuesday received the following telegram from Elmer Leffingwell of New York:

"From out of the historic past the voice of Abraham Lincoln, the martyred president of the United States, is lifted in unequalled support of the united war work campaign."

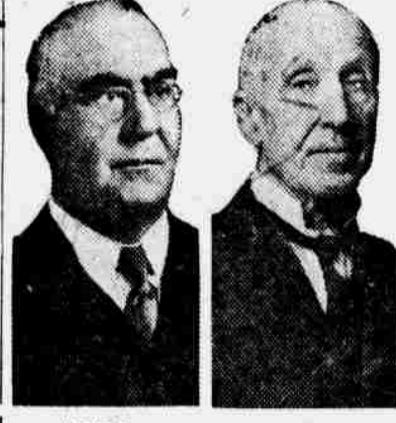
Lincoln Letter Produced. Out of his personal archives, Robert R. Reed of Washington has produced a letter from the great liberator and sent it to Dr. John R. Mott, director general of the combined war fund drive. The letter was written on February 22, 1863, at Washington. It was addressed to Alexander Reed, then general superintendent of the United States Christian commission. At that time this body was the only organization in existence in any way similar to the seven agencies now merged

"My Dear Sir: Your note by which you, as general superintendent of the United States Christian commission invite me to preside at a meeting to be held this day at the hall of the house of representatives in this city, is received."

"While for reasons which I deem sufficient, I must decline to preside, I cannot withhold my approval of the meeting and its worthy object. "Whatever shall be, sincerely and in God's name, devised for the soldier and seaman in their hard spheres of duty, can scarcely fail to be blessed, and whatever shall tend to turn our thoughts from the unreasoning and charitable passions, prejudices and jealousies incident to a great national trouble such as ours and fix them upon the vast and long

enduring consequences for weal or woe which are to result from the struggle and especially to strengthen our reliance on the Supreme Being for the final triumph of the right cannot but be well for us all. "The birthday of Washington and the Christian Sabbath, coinciding this year and suggesting together the highest interest of this life and of the life that is to come is most propitious for the meeting proposed."
