Corporal E. W. Fredrickson Describes Going Over Top and Routing Boches "Over There."

Corp. Edward W. Fredrickson of Fremont, now with the American expeditionary forces in France, was graduated from the Creighton College of Pharmacy four years ago He went to Fremont, where he managed a drug store until the time he entered military service. He is a brother of H. E. Fredrickson of Recently he wrote the home folks

the following letter of his experi-ences while 17 days in the trenches. Field Hospital No. -, Somewhere in France, Oct. 4.-I am tired of lying here just looking at the walls of this tent so I am going to sit up and try to write you a letter about the great American drive of September

Sees Guns Placed.

We, of course, had been occupy-ing the trenches in this salient for quite some time previous to the drive. During the preparation for it, which too, occupied a few days, we had the pleasure of seeing some of the guns placed. Nearly every morning as we awoke from our pleasant slumbers in our little hole in the ground we would see a change of environments with many new guns emplaced, and much ammunition by their sides. Two mornings before the grand event was to come off, we found a French "75" planted on each side of our dugout and wagonloads of ammunition nearby, some of which was placed over our abode. As we would see Fritz flying over us occasionally we had visions of him spying it and trying to destroy it with bombs and the like. Such an affair would surely have broken up our playhouse. Everything was set up in fine style the night before; it had rained for nearly a week previous, making the task a more difficult one, but nevertheless it was finally completed. We were ordered to another portion of the trenches and had to start just before the bombardment would begin and pass many of the big guns on the way. Well, I used up several pounds of

cotton in filling my ears, thinking it might keep some of the noise away but it did not help out much. We had about a mile to walk to reach our new location and no sooner had we started until the appointed hour had presented itself and the fun started. I never surmised there were as many guns in the world as our "Uncle" shot forth during the hours of bombarding. There were many planted along the road we were traveling and I know that mile seemed like four before we had d our starting point. About two hours before we were to go places in the trenches. As I have said before it rained and most of the time we were wading in mud and water, knee-deep in many places. This in itself was enough to make anyone desire to go over the top. Barrage Opens,

Just at daybreak our artillery "laid over" a dandy barrage and with the aid of the machine guns, I want to tell you there was quite a bit of noise permeating the atmosphere. There were many baby tanks present and soon they headed the parade to tear down barbwire entangle-ments and destroy machine gun nests as well as do other work. The Germans had plenty of barbwire, too, I assure you, as we found out later. A short distance behind the tanks came the first wave of men, then the second and third and before long, the "Hauses" and "Fritzes" were coming back our way prisoners of war. The artillery fired all day long and

the doughboys advanced steadily. Some places little difficulty was encountered while in others some stiff fighting was met by the enemy.

For two days this continued and then the last objective had been reached the boys started "digging " so as to be protected from shell fire. This was my first experience and I surely was glad I had crawled through the library window in Fremont, in order to register No. 1 on June 6, 1917, since otherwise I might not have had this to write down in my diary. We held these first lines for 17

lays before relief came and during this time I, like the other wing my not have a chance of removing my time I, like the other boys, did clothes once for a good night's rest or even a bath. The fleas, cooties. and myself all managed to live in one suit of clothes, but at times it became rather crowded.

L. Prepared for Winter.

The Germans were well prepared for the winter we found out when we reached the new country. Potatoes had been dug and stored, wood had been cut and laid away in neat piles and all other tasks were comleted so that they might have little to do this winter.

Many gardens were discovered and from the first one I found I plucked a head of cabbage and a few carrots and participated in a pleasant repast fit for any vegetarian. even though it was uncooked. There aren't many vegetables and greens in our menus, so as a consequence we enjoyed them immensely as we

still are doing.

Shortly after the drive I saw Tom

Since I have arrived at this hospital I have had a dandy warm bath, a hair cut and my mustache trimmed so I am feeling much cleaner now,

at least. Winter is beginning to set in over here; already we have had four frosty mornings with quite a supply of rain to make matters more un-pleasant. It surely can rain over here and I wish we could send a little of it down to Arizona for I feel quite sure France could spare it and I know they could use it down there. Well, I think I had better crawl under the covers for I believe I have sat up enough for a while. 
