

Aurora, Neb., Nov. 12.-(Special Telegram)-Judge E. E. Good, in the district court today, overruled the demurrers of the state of Nebraska and Hamilton county in the amous bank tax case here, involving the taxation of federal securities and the state immediately served notice that it would stand on its demurrer and appeal to the supreme court.

The decision of Judge Good is a victory for the bank and the federal government. It is understood that scores of cases are pending in the state of Nebraska awaiting the outcome of this suit before Judge Good. It is probable that the supreme

court will be asked to advance the case in order that a speedy decision may be reached. The First National bank here ap pealed from the order of the board of equalization, which declined to

deduct from the assets of the bank the war savings stamps, Liberty bonds, and certificates of indebtedness of the United States held by the bank.
