

BOYS REQUIRED TO REGISTER FOR WORK THURSDAY

All Between Fifteen Years,
Seven Months, and Eight-
een Must Sign Cards
on That Date.

All boys between 15 years, 7 months, and 18 years must register in some essential occupation Thursday, which is the national United States Boys' Working reserve registration day. The registration booths in Omaha will be at the three high schools, and every boy whether in school or out, must register. The boys will be enrolled in the same manner as the men were for the draft.

Each boy will be given a card to sign. This card contains questions for general information and a space in which the registrant must name some essential occupation to which he will devote his vacation months. The boys will be urged to select agriculture, for it is in this kind of work that their help is most urgently needed.

In due time each boy will be given a thorough physical examination and the result indicated on the back of his registration card. If found physically unfit the registrant will be exempted. If not he will be required to fill out a questionnaire. The occupations termed "essential" will be about the same for the boys as for the men.

Registration of the boys of the Central High school will be conducted during the home room period Thursday morning. About 400 boys are expected to register at Central high. Some of the boys who earned medals for service on farms last summer have been chosen to register non-students at the booth in the south hall.

Principal Dwight E. Porter of the High School of Commerce has charge of the registration of the boys in the city.

Armistice Terms Hard, But Hun Sins Heinous, Say British Papers

London, Nov. 13.—(British Wireless Service.)—The English newspapers today are filled with thanksgiving at the great victory achieved by the entente allies and pay glowing tributes to the forces which have brought "peace and justice to the world." In the editorials there is no sign of vindictiveness toward the German people, although the question is frequently discussed as to the "merciless peace" that Germany would have imposed if it had succeeded in forcing its will against the moral forces of the world. The newspapers assert the principles of the armistice terms are of a far different character from the terms Germany hoped to dictate.

The writers generally express the desire that Germany will soon obtain a stable and settled government for the reorganization of its new and free life.

"The allies have triumphed, not because of their strength, though that was immense, but because they fought for a great and noble cause," the Daily Mail asserts.

Marines Accepting Recruits Who May See Service Abroad

Cancellation of draft calls does not for the present, at least, affect recruiting for the marine corps, Sergt. Ralph R. Miller, in charge of the Omaha marine corps mobilization station, 608 Paxton block, said yesterday.

"The fact that no more men will be sent to cantonments does not mean that the marines will not continue to accept men, as while the war is over so far as Germany and her former allies are concerned, nevertheless there will be a great amount of work to do throughout Europe, for a year at least. The marines in France and the men now being enlisted in the marine corps will do this work, and I am sure that all men being accepted now will see service not only in France but in the countries that will be policed by the allied armies."

Thirty-nine men applied for enlistment in the marines at the Omaha office yesterday. Eighteen were accepted. A number of men who were entrained with Omaha's last quota for the national army, and who were returned here because the calls were cancelled, applied at the marine corps yesterday for enlistment.

Pulled Down by Chinese

Pekin, Nov. 13.—(By Associated Press.)—The news of the signing of the armistice was enthusiastically received in Peking. The American legation guard band visited the British legation and played patriotic airs. The British minister in a speech paid generous tribute to the United States. Afterwards allied troops paraded.

Flags of the allies were seen everywhere, and bells were rung. The statue of the former German emperor at Tien-Tsin, known locally as Tien Willie, was pulled down yesterday. Three holidays have been proclaimed here.

Polish People Set Up Own

Government at Warsaw

Amsterdam, Nov. 13.—A dispatch printed in the Dusseldorf Nachrichten, dated Cracow, says a directorate of the Polish people has been established at Warsaw under the leadership of Deputy Daszynski, leader of the Galician socialists. The dispatch adds that the regency council has been deposed.
