

### FRASER MEMBER U. S. INSURANCE ADVISORY BOARD

#### Omaha Man Named to Aid in Work of Arranging Post-War Risks to Be Taken by Government.

Washington, Nov. 13.—Preparations by the government for reinsuring the lives of soldiers and sailors on their return have been hastened by the signing of the armistice. Although regulations have not yet been fully drafted, it is certain that each of the 4,250,000 men in the military or naval service now holding voluntary government insurance will be permitted within five years after peace is declared to convert it without further medical examination into ordinary life, 20-pay life, endowment maturing at the age of 62, or other prescribed forms of insurance.

#### Premiums Monthly.

The government will arrange to collect premiums monthly, if men wish to pay this way, or for longer periods in advance. This may be done through post-offices. The minimum amount of insurance to be issued probably will be \$1,000 and the maximum \$10,000, with any amount between these sums in multiples of \$500. There will be provision for payments in case of disability as well as death, according to the tentative plan. The insurance may be purchased by any soldier, sailor or marine—officer, enlisted—and by women members of the army or navy corps, providing they already hold government voluntary life insurance. About 95 per cent of the 4,500,000 men in the service are covered by this insurance, which expires after they go back to civilian life and cease paying premiums. This is the system devised to replace the old pension plan of providing for ex-soldiers and sailors.

#### World's Biggest Institution.

This will be created out of the government's emergency life insurance bureau that is the largest insurance institution in the world for peace times, with more policy holders and greater aggregate risks than a half dozen of the world's biggest private companies combined. Out of the experience gained my eventually develop expansion of government insurance to old age, industrial and other forms, in the opinion of officials who have studied the subject.

The newspapers say this was the first instance in 400 years when such a renunciation was made. All privileges were given up by the archduke and his son.

#### Clifford Dunn, Killed, Was Twice Decorated Oversea

Clifford Dunn of New York City, brother of Mrs. W. M. Pardee, 2320 Dewey avenue, has been killed while in action while serving with the American expeditionary forces. He arrived overseas last April and observed July 4 at a listening post in No. Man's land. He was decorated twice for bravery.

#### Widow of Evangelist Dies.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 13.—Mrs. B. Fay Mills, widow of the well known evangelist, died here today after several months' illness. She is survived by six children, among them being Major Thornton B. Mills, of the United States air service at Portland, Ore., and Capt. Henry H. Mills, air service, also of Portland.

### Enemy Leaving Brussels and King Albert Will Soon Return to Capital

Paris, Nov. 13.—The Germans have begun the evacuation of Brussels. A Dunkirk dispatch to the Paris edition of the New York Herald says that King Albert and his family probably will re-enter Brussels next Friday.

British Headquarters in Flanders, Nov. 13.—(Havas.)—The German garrison in Brussels has revolted against the noncommissioned officers, according to neutrals reaching the British lines from Brussels. Several of the officers were killed.

### Ghent, Freed, Tells Stories of Martyrdom

#### Citizens of Belgian Town Suffered Sorely from German Occupation; Hun Morale Broken Before Truce.

Ghent, Nov. 13.—Citizens of Ghent, without distinction as to nationality, have greeted the allied troops as liberators. They relate the same stories of martyrdom that are current in every city delivered from the Germans. They were assailed at the quickness of the relief brought to them.

Deputy Anselme, acting burgomaster, who was thrice arrested by the Germans, told the correspondents that the food situation here is not desperate, but is serious enough. The city's greatest need is for brown paper with which temporarily to replace the thousands of windows smashed during the recent fighting. Ghent suffered no other serious damage. Robinson Smith, representative of the Belgian Relief Commission, arrived today and is organizing measures to assist the people.

For months past the morale of the German soldiers has been a source of great anxiety to their officers. Many mutinies were suppressed and many soldiers were shot. Three weeks ago 200 soldiers mutinied and paraded through the streets singing the "Marseillaise." They fired on Commandant Bluecher, a descendant of the famous marshal, who ordered 70 punished. A number were executed. Commandant Bluecher bitterly opposed capitulating.

### Jerry Howard is Only Democrat Elected to Nebraska Legislature

Official canvass of the Douglas county legislative ticket shows that Jerry Howard is the lone democrat in the contingent of five senators and 12 representatives, the irrepressible Jerry being in the latter division.

Victor D. Reynolds landed safely with the republicans in the list of representatives who will represent this county. James H. Bulla, who was counted in by the unofficial count, has been counted out by the official canvass.

This result gives the republicans of Douglas county 16 out of 17 on the delegation which will go to Lincoln in January.

### Wealth of Germany Quoted in Regard to Indemnity

Stockholm, Nov. 13.—Discussing the question as to what indemnity the entente allies might demand from Germany, Prof. Franz Oppenheimer writing to the Frankfurt Zeitung says the total national wealth of Germany before the war was estimated at 400,000,000,000 marks and the total national income at 40,000,000,000 marks. He estimated the annual cost of feeding and clothing the German people at 20,000,000,000 marks.

### EUROPE NEEDS HELP IN FOOD UNTIL SPRING

#### British Administrator Says the Situation is Serious and Intimates Further Sacrifices Necessary.

London, Nov. 13.—John Robert Clynes, British food controller, said today that the food situation in Europe continues to be serious, necessitating larger shipments until spring. He said that he confidently expected America to back up any British sacrifices which might be necessary in behalf of the needy peoples of Europe.

Mr. Clynes remarked that the situation had been prevented from becoming critical only by the fact that a certain amount of wheat flour reserves had accumulated in England.

He continued: "We are not yet sufficiently informed as to conditions in liberated and enemy countries to announce any definite policy. In liberated countries we are doing our best to meet emergencies as they arise, but this naturally involves an increase in what we previously estimated to be the minimum amount of imported food required by the allies from the United States, Canada and elsewhere."

"What action may be incumbent upon the allies remains to be seen. One thing is certain, that allied food control must be continued at any rate for many months after peace and probably be extended to take on international scope."

#### Need United States' Help.

"To effectively carry out this plan, the allies in Europe, during the vital period of recuperation, must rely upon a continuation of the far-sighted policy of the United States government in providing credits for food supplies."

"Apart from the allied situation as a whole, the commodities urgently needed in the British isles are wheat, butter, cheese and cattle feeds. Unless there is an improvement in the supplies of these commodities, the present meager rations are likely to be cut down and cattle supplies of the country may be reduced to such a minimum as to involve a long continued strain on the meat supplies available from other parts of the world."

"There is a strong feeling in this country that the bare necessities of life shall continue indefinitely under government control. This gathers strength from ever rising prices. I hope it may be possible to devise some plan of international action by which prices can be brought to an equitable basis and all profiteering in food necessary to maintain human existence may be eliminated."
