"Horrible food conditions prevail in Austria," said McLeed yeseterday, and it is quite possible that 1,000, 000 persons will die there this winter from lack of food, weakness and disease. "Scenes along the railways are like those on the battlefield. We saw bodies scattered here and there as a result of men crowding on the tops of trains and being swept off by tunnels. Terrible sanitary conditions prevail in little towns filled with returning soldiers.

"What Austria needs is food. That the other prisoners and I are alive is because of food received from outside of Austria. For three days a friend and I had between us only a little bad bread. It was about as big as a man's hand. Five hundred newly-arrived Serbian troops are keeping order at Lai-
