eentroversy between pro-German and pro-ally. While a storm brewed about him Mr. Watterson continued to consign the ruling houses of Germany and Austria-Hungary to perdition through the editorial columns of his paper. He laid stress on the fact that the United States could not keep out of the war and preached preparedness against the day when his prophecy was verified.
