to Handle Affairs. Tokio, Nov. 19 .- (By Associated Press.)-Negotiations are proceeding between the powers concerning the handling of the Russian question. Believing that the smooth operation of the Trans-Siberian and Chinese Eastern railroads is of prime necessity, it is understood that the United States has suggested the appointment of a managing directorate composed of representatives of the powers. It is reported the com-mission led by John F. Stevens, now in the far east, has been delegated to do this work.

Russians are willing to co-operate tiations. Question Not Important.

The Japanese viewpoint, as given to the Associated Press, is that it does not consider the question important because the arrangement would continue only until the end of the war. Thereafter it will be a Russian question to be decided by the Russians alone.

If America proposes that Russian railroads, including the Chinese Eastern, which traverses Manchuria, should be permanently operated by John F. Stevens, acting as an American, Japan undoubtedly would consider the question very important.

Censorship Discontinued. Washington, Nov. 19.-Discontinuance of postal censorship of press

communications was announced today by the censorship board. Correspondents abroad sending press material by mail for publication in this country may forward it in the regular way instead through the censorship offices New York and San Francisco.

Armies Rapidly Occupying Territory East of Rhine; Germans Leave Great Quantities of Stores.

Paris, Nov. 19 .- Progress by French troops advancing to occupy territory west of the Rhine is traced in the official statement issued at the war office. The statement fol-

"Our troops continue their march this morning and are being received with growing enthusiasm by the population of the occupied regions. The enemy has abandoned enormous quantities of material, locomotives, railroad cars, automobiles and maga-zines of all sorts. Thousands of French, Russian, English and Italian prisoners are entering our lines from German prisons.

"In Belgium we have passed the railroad running between Beurain and Florenville. Further east we have reached the line of Hoffgane, Bertrix and Straimont. Our troops Aux Chesnes, on the south bank of the Nied river, and are on the road toward Et. Avold. We are in the region of the heights of the Saar. Our troops have made solemn entry into Saarburg, Dieuze and Mohran-

gan. "In Alsace we have crossed Col Saverne and have installed our advance guards at the gates of Was-selnheim and Molsheim. Further south we are in the proximity of the Rhine from north of Neu Breisach as far as the Swiss frontier."


