NEW YORK COFFEE. The text of communications which have passed recently between the coffee trade and the food administration was published in the exchange today. They indicated that the Washington authorities had offered to re-examine the rules governing trading in futures on the New York exchange, to take effect on a date to be determined by the board of managers of the exchange, but that existing regulations and rules regarding transactions in actual coffee would continue. Members of the exchange objected to reopening the futures market for unrestricted trading with restrictions maintained in force in the spot market and a petition embodying these objections was sent to Washington. The board of managers requested for reconsideration. Pending the outcome, business remained practically at a standstill in both spot and futures and the local spot market. A small lot of Rio tea was reported sold in the spot market at 18c, but it was stated that this did not establish a price, as the cost of various lots in stock here varied largely and there were no firm quotations. Available in the official cables reported no change in Brazilian markets except Santos futures, which were unchanged to 75 cents higher.
