

HARRISON BILL FOR CLERKSHIP BIG SURPRISE

Norris Amendment Finds Little Favor in Senate; Alleged Play for Position for Campaign Manager.

Washington, Nov. 23.—(Special) Senator Harrison returned from his successful hunting expedition after votes in Nebraska when he threw a bombshell into the senate by a resolution seeking to amend the rules so that any senator appointed chairman of one of the more important committees, including foreign relations, appropriations, judiciary and others, should not be a member of any of the other committees included in this list.

It would mean the complete overthrow of the rule of seniority in senate committee assignments, for some of the senators, long in service, are members of two or more of the committees.

But there is no chance of the Norris amendment being put through, it is said. In the first place, the democrats are in control now and a large majority of the democrats would oppose the proposed rule and it is a safe guess that a majority of the republicans would do the same.

Play for Clerkship. Senator Norris, it is thought, is indulging in a play to secure a good committee chairmanship, a committee that will pay a clerk anywhere from \$2,000 to \$2,500, for Frank Harrison, Senator Norris' campaign manager.

ager, who would not think of coming to Washington for a less salary. Leading republican senators, while regretting the action of the Nebraska senator, were of the opinion that harmony would prevail in their ranks when it comes to the reorganization under republican control after March 3 next. They said they looked for no unusual trouble on account of committee assignments if there would be plenty of important assignments to care for the members of the progressive wing of the party when the time came.

Cheer End of War.

"The war thus comes to an end," said President Wilson to the joint assembly of congress at 1 p. m. Monday, November 11, and grave senators united with the more common-place representatives in making the hall of the house ring with boisterous cheers.

"God has in His good pleasure given us peace again," said the president in his Thanksgiving proclamation and on the same day the secretary of war published plans for the immediate demobilization of 2,000,000 troops in American camps.

A few weeks ago Senator Kenyon of Iowa, delivered a carefully prepared speech in favor of a national budget and pointed out the wasteful extravagance of 29 committees in congress having the power to report appropriation bills; and only last week both parties in the senate began the preparation of plans for retrenchment and reform to meet the enormous burden put upon the people through the appropriation of \$57,000,000,000 to meet the expense of the war.

Senators' Memory Short.

But the memory of senators is short. On Monday, November 18, just one week after they had vociferously applauded the president's announcement "the war thus comes to an end," the senate, on motion of Senator Kenyon, receded from the Pomeroy amendment and solemnly adopted the conference report on

the bill to "stimulate agriculture" with its war-time prohibition rider. The war has come to an end and "God has in His good pleasure given us peace," and the president has before him a bill to appropriate \$20,000,000 for the stimulation of agriculture and declare prohibition throughout the nation as a war measure. The senate had this bill before it for six months, its appropriations were ridiculed as graft and its prohibition declared to be beyond the constitutional power of congress in the exercise of its war power; and yet the senate waited until the war was over before it passed this bill for war-time prohibition.

If unconscious humor is the only real humor that touches the risibilities of the human race, the U. S. senate has given us the best bit of humor of the war or after the war period, for the senate was unconscious of being funny. This war-time prohibition is to be ushered in on the first of July 1919, and the senate has before it a resolution to make July 4 a national holiday and have an international peace celebration in Washington next Fourth of July, with Field Marshal Foch, Premier Clemenceau of France, General Haig and Lloyd George and possibly King George as our national guests to join with the American people in celebration of the final settlement of this war through a treaty of peace that will then have been ratified.

It may be that Senator Kenyon and his colleagues in the senate have it in mind to show our guests from Europe of how little force is a written constitution when it is applied to the freedom of the senate in legislation. It may also be that the appropriation of \$20,000,000 to enable several thousand appointees of this administration to sit by the fire this winter and go through the farce of making a survey of food production to feed the world, had more influence in adopting Senator Kenyon's motion than any other argument, because it was entirely contradictory of Kenyon's argument in favor of a national budget.

Friend of Omaha Woman to Go to Nevada Legislature

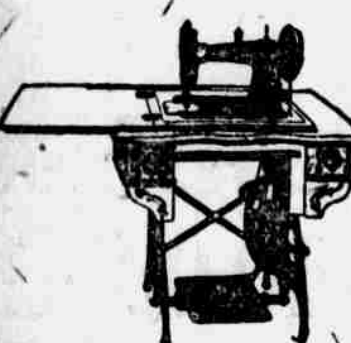
