

SOLE TO RESIGN AS SECRETARY, BERLIN RUMOR

Bavaria Breaks Its Relations With Hun Government; Hamburg Plots With Russian Soviet.

London, Nov. 18.—(British Wireless Service.)—In connection with reports that the resignations of Dr. Solf, the German foreign secretary, and Matthias Erzberger, another member of the cabinet, are expected, it is stated in a Copenhagen message that documents are to be published containing many compromising facts regarding the activities of Erzberger during the earlier years of the war.

Bavaria has broken relations with the Berlin government, according to a Munich message, transmitted by the Central News correspondent at Copenhagen.

The Vienna government intends to bring to trial all persons responsible for the war, including Count Jerichow, Austro-Hungarian foreign minister when the war broke out, and Count Czernin, foreign minister at a later period, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen today.

Former Emperor Charles, the Austrian grand duke and a number of generals are also to be tried, according to these advices.

Hamburg, Nov. 27.—(By Associated Press.)—Foreign Secretary Solf has brought the charge that the Hamburg soldiers' and workmen's council is in independent communication with the Russian soviet government. This charge appears to be based on the fact that the marines in charge of the wireless station here are constantly interchanging messages from the bolsheviks, whose radiograms are promptly reproduced in the official organ, the Red Flag, for propaganda purposes.

Thousands of Jews Are Slain by Poles, Says German Paper

Berlin, Nov. 28.—(By Associated Press.)—The charge that the Poles, after capturing Lemberg, the Galician capital, sacked the Jewish quarter, where the victims numbered several thousand, is made by the Lemberg correspondent of the Berlin Tageblatt, who says he left the Galician city November 24. He telegraphs his newspaper from Breslau as follows:

"Since Friday Lemberg, which has been the scene of desperate street fighting, is again in the hands of the Poles, after having been stubbornly defended by the Ukrainians. The casualties among the soldiers and civilians are estimated as in excess of 1,000. A large section of the inner city was completely destroyed.

"Immediately upon entering the city the Poles proceeded to sack and burn the Ghetto district. The streets were filled with the charred bodies of murdered Jews, many of whom, in the frenzy of despair, had leaped from the burning buildings, which were surrounded by Polish troops. The Polish authorities declined to take measures to halt the slaughter. Polish legions roped off the streets leading to the Ghetto and methodically proceeded to pillage, rape and burn.

"The Polish authorities are attempting to blame uniformed hangers on the pogroms, although it is commonly known that the terrorists are not only amply supplied with arms and munitions, but that they threatened the Jews in the event Lemberg was captured."

Australia is Anxious to Sell Its Big Crop of Wheat

London, Nov. 28.—(Via Montreal.)—William Hughes, Australian premier, has received a cablegram from W. A. Watt, the treasurer of the Australian government, stating that in view of the fact that the wheat harvest is estimated at least £10,000,000, the Australian wheat board considers it desirable to sell 1,000,000 tons of wheat at a minimum price of 57 pence (approximately \$1.18) per bushel, provided that Australia is permitted to compete in the world markets and is able to reserve the rest of the wheat supply on hand.

Brazil to Seek Indemnity for Its War Expenditures

Rio Janeiro, Nov. 28.—In discussing the coming peace conference at Versailles, Foreign Minister de Gama said today that the Brazilian representatives would participate in the discussions on the recognition of frontiers, the recognition of the claims of nationalities, the disposition of the German colonies and the fixing of indemnities. With regard to the last subject, Senor De Gama said:

"It is only natural that Brazil should desire to be indemnified for the expenses arising from its intervention in the war."

Davison Back from Europe. New York, Nov. 28.—Henry P. Davison, head of the American Red Cross, and Allen Wardwell, Red Cross commissioner in Russia, were passengers on the French liner Espagne, which arrived here today.

The government will soon introduce a bill repatriating Spanish subjects who have fought under allied flags.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 28.—Anne Dorin, employed at a Liberty motor plant here, was arrested last night on a warrant sworn out in Chicago charging violation of the espionage act in connection with the disappearance of plans for the airplane motor.

According to intelligence bureau officers, Miss Dorin admitted, when taken into custody, she had written letters to Ira J. O'Malley, now under arrest in Chicago, and bragged about her knowledge of the Liberty motor. She is 28 years old and says she came back here a month ago from Elmira, N. Y.

Lima, Peru, Nov. 28.—The Peruvian government is apparently determined to prevent the occurrence of untoward incidents here in connection with the Peruvian-Chilean dispute. The situation continues calm.
