

A united effort to stamp out the Spanish influenza in Omaha has been organized by City Health Commisto effect today.

It is to be an "individual" united effort. That is, every person will be expected to do his share in preventing any possibility of the spread of the disease.

Thousands of posters have been printed, and will be put up in churches, retail stores, wholesale houses, store windows, street cars and other public places. These read as follows in large type:
