

LABOR BOARD WON'T CONSIDER FIREMEN'S CASE

Zimman Now Asking Aid to Get Bill for Higher Wages Passed by the Next Legislature.

City Commissioner Zimman has received word from the War Labor board at Washington, to which an appeal was made by Omaha City Firemen's union, that the question of the right of municipal employees to organize was a separate matter from the right to organize industrial plants, and it therefore refused to assume jurisdiction.

This puts the question upon its former basis.

Commissioner Zimman said: "There is now a cordial feeling existing between the department and the city executives. We are on speaking terms and both feel confident of the loyalty of each other, and we will work for our mutual interests."

"I have interviewed nearly all of the members-elect of both houses of the incoming legislature with a view to the passage of legislation to increase the wages of firemen."

Zimman Asks Aid.

"I have invited representatives of the firemen to constitute a committee to work with the city commission to obtain this relief. I have received very favorable answers from the legislators who will act on the subject. I aim to reach Governor-elect McKelvie with a view to have him address a special message to the legislature to have the relief bill given priority so the men can have the earliest possible benefits."

"Commissioner Kinger is equally interested with me in behalf of the police department and we are all working harmoniously to quickly obtain for the men their just demands."

Surrender of German Air Fleet Being Made Few Planes at a Time

London, Dec. 5.—There will be no formal surrender of German airplanes as was at one time expected, because it has been found impracticable to assemble 2000 airplanes at one place, and it is doubtful whether Germany has a sufficient number of pilots for that purpose. Hence the first surrender in history of an air fleet is being effected by piecemeal. The Germans are shedding their wings in the course of retreat and the advancing allies are picking them up.

Christabel Pankhurst Becomes Candidate for Parliamentary Seat

London, Wednesday, Dec. 4.—Among the candidates for Parliament nominated yesterday were 14 women. They include Miss Christabel Pankhurst, daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the suffrage leader; Mrs. Frederick Pethick Lawrence, joint editor of "Votes for Women"; Miss Mary McArthur, secretary of the British Women's trades union, and Countess Georgina Mackenzie of Dublin, the Sinn Fein leader.

All Romanoffs Murdered by Bolshevik, Valet Says

London, Dec. 5.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam says the Kiev newspapers publish a story given by the valet of the former empress of Russia of the murder of the entire Romanoff family by the bolsheviks. According to this story the once royal family was compelled to live in a single room of a convent at Ekaterinburg for weeks before the murder, under guard of bolshevik soldiers, who insulted them shamefully.

The valet said on July 17 all the members of the family were taken to the cellar of the convent and placed against the wall and shot. The murderers granted the last request of the former emperor that his wife, who was ill, should die in his arms.

According to the valet, the grand duchess Tatiana was only wounded by the shots and was killed by blows from the rifle butts. All the bodies were burned.

Stockmen Are to Study Problems of Industry

Denver, Colo., Dec. 5.—A call was issued today by T. W. Tomlinson, secretary, summons the American National Live Stock association to meet here on January 21 for its 22d annual convention. The session will last three days.

The stockmen, according to the call, will give attention to post-war readjustments affecting their industry, including the settlement of railroad ownership, trade conditions trade conditions resultant from the peace conference and plans affecting the federal food administration.

The call states that there will be discussion also of the work of the bureau of markets in the regulation of stockyards and commission men, the regulation of prices of hides and wool by the war industries board, precautions against future outbreak of the foot and mouth disease and influenza among horses and railroad service.

Prince Henry of Prussia Loyal to Former Kaiser

Amsterdam, Dec. 5.—Prince Henry of Prussia, has addressed an announcement to all the members of the Prussian royal house, according to the Kreuz Zeitung, of Berlin, in which he says:

"I am forced to recognize the king's abdication and will assist in the policy for order and the constitutional government. But on the other hand I consider myself personally attached to my king to the end of my life and shall do everything to preserve him from harm and shall recognize him absolutely as the sole family head."
