## **Ride from Station to Prince** Murat Home Unbroken Ovation, Constantly Growing in Fervor.

Paris, Dec. 14.-In the procession from the railway station to the Prince Murat home, the first carriage was occupied by President Wilson and President Poincare and the second carriage by Mrs. Wilson. 
