

PRESIDENT BOWS CONTINUOUSLY TO PARIS CROWDS

Ride from Station to Prince Murat Home Unbroken Ovation, Constantly Growing in Fervor.

Paris, Dec. 14.—In the procession from the railway station to the Prince Murat home, the first carriage was occupied by President Wilson and President Poincare and the second carriage by Mrs. Wilson, Madame Poincare, Mme. Jusserand and Miss Margaret Wilson. Those in other carriages were: Third, American Ambassador Sharp, Premier Clemenceau and Generals Morlaix and Desparge; fourth, Secretary of State Lansing and Foreign Minister Pichon; fifth, General Bliss and Mr. Henry White; sixth, General Pershing and Ambassador Jusserand; seventh, Admiral Benson and Captain Tardieu, French high commissioner to the United States; and eighth, Admiral Grayson, General Harts and Lieutenant Colonel Lobez.

Acknowledges Salutations.
During the ride from the railway station, the president was smiling and almost continuously he took off his hat and bowed to the right and left. Waves of voices answered his salutation, broken by the sharp bark of guns at intervals of 15 seconds. The reception to the president, in the estimation of some onlookers, appeared to have drawn out a greater crowd than welcomed either King George or King Albert on their recent visit.

The people, crowded thickly upon the grassy slope of the old Paris fortifications, could be heard crying in English: "Welcome Wilson! Long live Wilson!" Or in great choruses like a college yell shouting "Wilson, Wilson, Wilson!"

The procession left the Porte Dauphine just a few minutes after the president arrived. The scene was impressive as the crowds cheered and then uncovered reverently as the hands played the "Star Spangled Banner." A large throng was gathered at the Arc de Triomphe, where the procession turned down the Champs Elysees continuing down the thoroughfare until the bridge Alexander III was reached. After crossing the Seine, the procession moved past the building of the chamber of deputies and again

Paris Revives Medieval Tradition in Conferring Citizenship on Wilson

Paris, Dec. 14.—In unanimously voting yesterday to confer upon President Wilson the title of a citizen of Paris, the municipal council was reviving a medieval tradition, declared Councillor Gent, who moved the resolution. It was formerly the custom to confer honorary citizenship of the city upon those who had rendered distinguished services not only to Paris, but to the entire country. He pointed out that at the time of the French revolution the title had been conferred on British, Italian, and American personages.

"But what the president will particularly appreciate," said Mr. Gent, "is that one of those to whom Paris paid the same tribute that it is today paying him was the great George Washington."

"The thought that moved me to make this proposal arose from a desire to pay a tribute of gratitude and admiration to the great statesman who has framed in imperishable language the conditions of the future peace and life of nations."

crossed the Seine to the Place de la Concorde.

The French senators and deputies with their families and friends, some 5,000 in all, filled the columned porticos of the chamber of deputies and massed trumpeters blew a fanfare as President Wilson's carriage crossed the Concord bridge and entered the immense square. American flags were draped on colossal statues of Lille and Strasbourg.

Mrs. Wilson, in a tan tailor-made suit and wearing a picture hat with one dark plume, shared in the applause.

The names of President Poincare and Premier Clemenceau were often called out.

A tremendous throng was gathered there and set up a mighty roar. As the procession approached the center of the city, the enthusiasm seemed to become greater and when the Church of the Madeleine was reached the applause attained its greatest height.

President Wilson seemed greatly affected as he passed the Church of the Madeleine, for the American societies had gathered there and they raised a characteristic American cheer as he went by, ending with a "tiger."

The procession reached the Prince Murat mansion at exactly 10:45 o'clock.

French colonial troops occupied places of honor near the residence of Prince Murat, playing the music of their weird national anthem on reed instruments until the presidential party entered the house.

LEAGUE GIVEN FIRST PLACE IN WILSON'S TALKS

Co-Operation of Nations to Keep Down Militarism Is Necessary, He Tells Socialist Delegation.

Paris, Dec. 14.—In two speeches today President Wilson reaffirmed that the making of peace and the creation of a league of nations must be accomplished as one single objective.

Responding to the welcome of President Poincare at the luncheon given in his honor, President Wilson declared that winning the war was not alone enough, but that the people of the United States had entered it with the object of making the peace a permanent peace for the world.

Responding to the greeting of the socialist delegation the president reiterated that the war had been a people's war and that the defeat of military autocracy was not sufficient to the fulfilling of its objects. He again declared that the co-operation of the nations for the security of the peace to be made was wholly necessary.

Address to Socialists.
This speech follows:

"Gentlemen: I received with great interest the address which you have just read to me. The war through which we have just passed has illustrated in a way which never can be forgotten the extraordinary wrongs which can be perpetrated by arbitrary and irresponsible power."

"It is not possible to secure the happiness and prosperity of the world, to establish an enduring peace, unless the repetition of such wrongs is rendered impossible. This has, indeed, been a people's war. It has been waged against absolutism and militarism, and these enemies of liberty must from this time forth be shut out from the possibility of working their cruel will upon mankind."

Urges League of Nations.
"In my judgment it is not sufficient to establish this principle. It is necessary that it should be supported by a co-operation of the nations which shall be based upon

fixed and definitive covenants and which shall be made certain of effectiveness through the instrumentality of a league of nations. I believe this to be the conviction of all thoughtful and liberal men."
"I am confident that this is the thought of those who lead your own great nation, and I am looking forward with peculiar pleasure to co-operation with them in securing guarantees of a lasting peace of justice and right dealing which shall justify the sacrifices of this war and cause men to look back upon those sacrifices as the dramatic and final processes of their emancipation."

French Labor Federation Presents Address to Wilson

Brest, Dec. 14.—Representatives of the French General Federation of Labor presented to President Wilson when he landed here an address declaring that the workers of France welcomed him joyfully. The address said that the president's proclamation of his 14 points was an epoch in the history of the world, "shedding light in a night of blood."

The address concluded by saying that the French workers wished to facilitate the president's efforts toward a durable peace.

Troop of "Sea Scouts" Will Be Recruited in Each Community

New York, Dec. 14.—Recruiting in each community of a troop of "sea scouts" intended to prepare boys for the merchant marine will be one of the features of "anniversary week" of the Boy Scouts of America, February 7 to February 13, under plans adopted at a conference of officers of the organization here today.

NATIONALISTS DEFEATED BY SINN FEINERS

London, Dec. 14.—The general election day proved to be one of the quietest Great Britain has witnessed in years. There is no great domestic issue before the electors, while with the exception of the small pacifist group, the campaign has appeared to indicate that there is no sharp division of opinion as to the country's attitude toward the peace conference.

Polling Passes Quietly in British Elections Except for Minor Collisions in Ireland.

London, Dec. 14.—The preliminary diplomatic conferences among the allies, which were suspended temporarily pending the arrival of President Wilson, will be resumed early next week, according to Le Journal today. David Lloyd George, the British premier, and A. J. Balfour, the British foreign secretary, are expected on Monday or Tuesday, the newspaper states, while Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino of Italy will arrive with King Victor Emmanuel on the coming Thursday, December 19.

Delegates to Resume Parleys Upon Peace

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Dr. Harden Considered as Special Advocate on Germany's Behalf

Berlin, Dec. 14.—While no names are mentioned in connection with the appointment of German peace delegates, it is known that the government has the subject under discussion. The appointment of Maximilian Harden, editor of the Die Zukunft, as a special advance delegate, appears to be much in favor. The editor's admirers are even urging him to go to the United States for the purpose of presenting Germany's case.

Dreadnaughts Return.

Brest, Dec. 14.—The American dreadnaught fleet of 10 ships which escorted President Wilson into port yesterday sailed today for New York. The fleet is expected to reach its destination before Christmas. The warships set sail at 2 p. m. The steamer George Washington, which brought President Wilson here, is taking troops on board today and will sail tomorrow with 4,000 American soldiers.
