#### No Money in Sight for Increase in Pay of Firemen and Police

Where is the city going to get the money to pay increases in salaries of policemen and firemen durin- the year, 1919? This is a question which City Commissioner Ure, superintendent of the department of accounts and finance, is trying to solv :. "When we considered the levy last

July we counted on a possible in-crease of 10 per cent to the police-men and firemen," he said. "The charter commission is now talking of increases of 10, 20 and 30 per cent, varying according to the present sal-

ary in each case.
"This would take about \$175,000 extra for the year instead of the \$100,000 we counted on when we

made the levy.
"If the legislature grants an increase greater than 10 per cent we should also secure some legislation which will enable us to issue warrants for the extra money above \$100,000 and then provide for taking care of these warrants out of the 1920 levy."
