Now York, Jan. 4.-The week which witnessed the expiration of the old year and the advent of the new was replete with interesting and significant developments in the financial market, sentiment undergoing unmistakable improvement. Reactions of the last days of December, which assumed severe proportions in many instances, were largely if not wholly regained while numerous specialties, notably ils and kindred shares, registered spec acular advances.

Ralls and industrials participated extensively in the rise, particularly some of the low priced speculative issues of roads traversing western and southwestern sections of the country. The activity and strength of those shares was again ascribed to foreign accumulations.
