Bill for New County Board is Introduced in the State Legislature

Lincoln, Jan. 23.—A bill was introduced in the house today by Representative Maurer, Gage, prohibiting the forcible detention in the houses of the Good Shepherd and providing for the inspection of convents and monasteries by the sheriff of the county, the grand jury or by any person designated by a judge of a court of record upon petition of 20 citizens.

Bill to Raise Bailiffs' Pay Passes Upper House

Lincoln, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—S. F. No. 21, increasing the pay of Douglas county bailiffs from \$1,200 to \$1,400 a year passed the senate on third reading this morning.

Another bill of interest to Omaha people which passed was S. F. No. 10, by Sears, fixing the compensation to be paid the three judges appointed as a board of appraisement for the city gas plant at \$15 per day. There was no opposition to either measure.

New Bill Continues Terms of Various County Officers. Lincoln, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—A new bill of great interest is the one of Burney in the house, which continues the terms of clerks of the district court, county commissioners and county assessors to 1922, making their terms two years longer and provides for an election every four years thereafter.

Bill Pertaining to Social Disease Before Senate

Lincoln, Jan. 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Senator Sears' bill making it a felony to furnish information of a sexual nature, or pertaining to social diseases, to a child under 16 years of age had an airing before the senate judiciary committee this afternoon.

Arlington Home Guards Disbanded; Keep Uniforms. Fremont, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—The Arlington home guards were disbanded at a meeting attended by a large representation. It was voted to continue the organization as a National Rifle club.

Legislative Notes

Cordell, speaking in behalf of the committee, said the members did not shy from tackling the proposition and was corroborated by Lieut. Gov. P. A. Barrows, who announced that he had personally requested the bill be sent to the education committee.

North Bend Man Cooked Own Breakfast So Wife Could Get Enough Rest

Fremont, Neb., Jan. 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Ernest Kern of North Bend, on trial in district court for sedition, took the stand this afternoon in his own behalf. Kern denied making the statements concerning members of the North Bend home guards that led to the filing of the complaint. He testified that he had cooked his own breakfast for a long period last summer in order that his wife, who was active in Red Cross work, could have bed mornings and get her rest.

Great New Concrete Bridge at Grand Island Open

Grand Island, Neb., Jan. 23.—(Special Telegram.)—The Burlington's new cement steel bridge over the Platte river was put into use today. The bridge has been under construction for the past two years. It is 13 feet higher than the former wooden bridge and has immense spans. House Bills.

(Introduced Thursday.) H. R. No. 188, by Jenkins—Various amendments to game law. H. R. No. 189, by Foster—Appropriates \$224.46 for relief of Mrs. J. M. Thor, for damages due to death of son, Charles, by accident at Kearney industrial school. H. R. No. 190, by Schubert—Repeals law of 1911 permitting county superintendent, county clerk and county board to enlarge school district. H. R. No. 191, by Davis—Increases maximum tax levy for public library maintenance from three to five mills. H. R. No. 192, by Williams—Provides that when schools are closed because of epidemic of disease, teachers' salaries shall continue.

COMMITTEE TO INSPECT STATE INSTITUTIONS
